Florist Says Care Of Plants Begins With Proper Soils

The care of potted plants begins with careful preparation of the soil, J. Coulter Smith, Bryan florist, told the A. & M. Garden Club Friday afternoon.

Once the soil has been prepared, the next thing is to obtain proper drainage, he said. Regular feeding, preferably in liquid form, spraying for insects, and placing the plant in the proper location in the house conclude the preliminary stages, Smith told the Garden Club.

Most plants do best in an east window, which should be raised sometimes to give the plants fresh air, it was stated. Approximately two tablespoons of balanced fertilizer should be given the plant for each gallon of water, Smith said.

For those persons who wish to transplant their Christmas poinsettias out-of-doors after the plant has dropped its bloom, Smith advised them to place the pot in a cool dark place and place outdoors after the middle of March, preferably in a southeast corner of the house.

Mrs. H. W. Barlow, president, presided at a business meeting before the program. Mrs. D. W. Wilson was presented the door prize which was a box of gladiolus bulbs given by Mrs. D. W. Williams, who also distributed the January Garden Club calendars.

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Pasture Course To Be Added By Agronomy Dept.

Pasture Management (Agronomy 417) to be offered this Spring Semester, according to Dr. J. E. Adams, head of the agronomy department, the course carries 3 credit hours with 2 theory and 3 laboratory hours a week. Instructor will be A. W. Crain of the Agronomy Department.

The course includes adaption and management of native and introduced pasture plants; their establishment, production, utilization and maintenance in permanent and temporary pastures. Several weekend field trips are scheduled to important farming areas of Texas to study pastures, and pasture experiments.

Prerequisites are to be Agronomy 308, or Biology 346, or Range and Forestry 303.

W. D. Harris Will Address Engineers
