CAIRO, Jan. 15—(AP)—Assad Dagher, chief of the press section of the Arab League, told a news conference today the league has recommended that Arab nations occupy all Palestine with regular armies when British troops leave.

NOW ITS AIR WAR IN JERUSALEM

JERUSALEM, Jan. 15—(AP)—A plane which British military officials said they believed was Jewish-piloted fired on an RAF reconnaissance craft today over Kfar Etzion in the mountain area south of Jerusalem, where Jews and Arabs had been locked in a bloody 24-hour battle.

TO START CATTLE FENCE IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 15—(AP)—Immediate construction has been authorized for a five-strand barbed wire fence, 55 miles in length, to prevent northward spread of the foot and mouth disease in Mexico. The fence is the first section of a fence that eventually will stretch from Tamaulipas, Veracruz state, to the Pacific Coast at Puerto Vallarta, Northern Jalisco state. The first section will be from Tamaulipas, on the Pan American highway between Laredo, Texas, and Mexico City.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 15—(AP)—President M. E. Sadler opened Texas Christian University's Diamond Jubilee celebration here today with a pledge that the school was "fully committed to the maintenance, the enrichment and the expansion of the American Democratic way of life."

ANGLETON, TEX., Jan. 15—(AP)—A shakeup in management personnel of the Darrington Prison Farm, scene of the escape of 11 convicts who overpowered a guard, was ordered yesterday by O. E. Ellis, who only two weeks ago became general manager of the Texas prison system.

SENATORS DEMAND GOLD HOARDS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15—(AP)—Senators yesterday emphasized demands that the 16 nations to receive aid under the Marshall Plan pledge their hoards of "gold and dollars" abroad and their investments in this country to help cover costs of the \$6,800,000,000 European recovery program.

CHICAGO, Jan. 15—(AP)—James C. Petrillo yesterday was acquitted on a charge of violating the Lea Act which Congress passed to curb his broad union powers.

TRUMAN WARNS OF SEVERE DEPRESSION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15—(AP)—President Truman yesterday renewed his demand for anti-inflation controls, asserting that soaring prices may lead to a "severe business depression." The chief executive made the plea in his second annual economic report submitted to a Republican-controlled Congress which thus far has been hostile to his request for standby price, wage and rationing authority.

FRENCH REDS DEMAND VICE-PRESIDENCY

PARIS, Jan. 15—(AP)—Communists resumed a bitter fight yesterday for the vice-presidency of the French National Assembly, charging that attempts to deprive the largest single party in the assembly of that post would be unconstitutional.

NEW TYPE SYNTHETIC MADE AT BORGER

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15—(AP)—A new type of rubber is about to get into production at Borger, Texas. The product is known as "GRS" which stands for "Government Rubber—Styrene Type." It is produced at low temperatures rather than the generally used high temperatures.
