All the games will be played in the A&M Consolidated Gym and DeWare Field House, with the tournament finals being staged in the field house Saturday afternoon and night.





The East Texas State Lions moved into the runnerup slot with a close 47-43 triumph over University of Houston and retained the best season record in the loop with 12 wins against one setback.

The Cadets have a less impressive Conference record than the blue and grey quintet, primarily because they have played two more conference games. Arkansas, Baylor and Texas have all taken the Farmers in stride, and while the team from the Ozarks had their troubles in sweeping the game, the maroon and white squad has been decisively walloped in their last two outings.

The Feathered Flock from Houston have had their feathers ruffled by two Conference foes, Texas and Baylor, and have had a hard time finding the win column against outside opposition as well.
