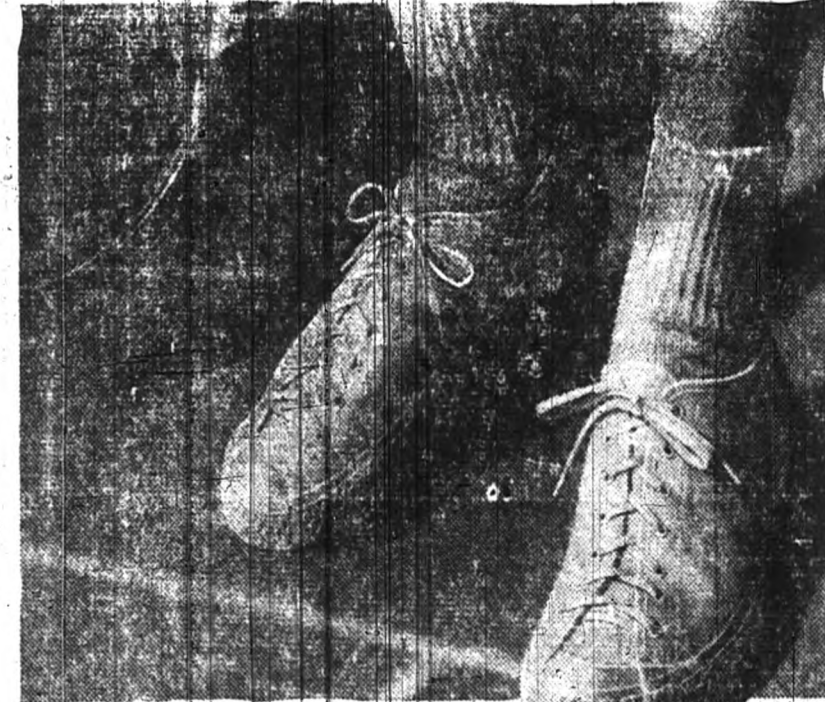
He Starves for India

Gandhi's Fasting Once Again Breaks Knot in Indian Strife

 "He has changed the face of India, given pride and character to a cringing and demoralized people, built up strength and consciousness in the masses and made the Indian problem a world problem."

 Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi, the Great Soul of India, has fasted 10 times for his people. Three of them lasted 21 days.  
 Here's the list:  
 1. MARCH 1918—3 days to force mill owners to accede to the workers' demands.  
 2. NOVEMBER 1921—5 days to pacify Bombay rioters over a visit of the Prince of Wales (now Duke of Windsor).  
 3. SEPTEMBER 1921—21 days to heal a breach in the Congress Party between Home Rule and Non-cooperation factions.  
 4. SEPTEMBER 1932—1 day to protest Ramsay MacDonald's grant of separate electorates for untouchables under the proposed constitution.  
 5. MAY 1933—21 days to force the cause of untouchables.  
 6. AUGUST 1933—7 days while in jail because the British would not let him write for the newspapers.  
 7. JULY 1934—7 days. As a public penance for an attack on a party of Satanists.  
 8. MARCH 1939—4 days. To bring settlement of dispute over constitutional reform in the state of Rajkot.  
 9. FEBRUARY 1943—21 days. To protest his confinement behind barbed wire in the palace of the Aga Khan.  
 10. JANUARY 13, 1948—5 days. To restore communal peace in India.  
 The Mahatma announced two of these as "fasts unto death," and attracted world attention. In addition he began several minor fasts, breaking one of 24 hours over strife in India on his 78th birthday, last October 2.

Cavallero Will Select TSCW Beauties Feb. 14

Valentine Ball To Follow Soph Dance, Feb. 13

Carmen Cavallero, "poet of the piano," will choose the four reigning beauties from the sixteen nominees selected for the TSCW annual, Daedalium, on the stage of Guion Hall at 7 p. m., February 14. Grady Elms, assistant director of Student Activities, announced today.

Four beauty nominees from each class at TSCW will be presented and one winner will be chosen from each class. Admission to the concert, which will range from classical to popular music, is 75 cents, tax included.

After the concert, Cavallero and his orchestra will play for the St. Valentine's Ball which begins at 9 p. m. in Sblisa Hall. Admission to the ball is \$2 tax included, stag or drag.

Included on the concert program are the numbers "Rumba Marie," "Anitra's Boogie," "Rhapsody in Blue" and "Enlora," better known as "Voodoo Moon." "Rumba Marie" is the Cavallero's adaptation of Victor Young's music for the film production, "For Whom the Bell Tolls." The Cuban rhythm number, "Voodoo Moon," was made famous by Cavallero in the picture "Hollywood Castles."

The Italian medley, played by Cavallero and his orchestra as one selection on the concert program, incorporates a number of folk songs from the land of Cavallero's ancestors. In this group are Teselli's "Serenade," the title number of his latest record collection, "Tango of the Roses," and "Come Back to Sorrento."

Proceeding Cavallero's appearance the Sophomore Ball will be held Friday night, February 13. The Aggieband Orchestra will play.

Time Study Course Planned for B&A

Civil Service To Offer Warehouse Examiner Exams

Examinations for warehouse examiner positions in the Department of Agriculture, have been announced by the Civil Service Commission.

To qualify, applicants must have had 3 to 5 years' experience in managing a grain warehouse or elevator, or inspecting grain. For the higher paying jobs experience in analyzing grain warehousemen's financial statements is also required. Appropriate college study may be substituted for as much as 3 years of experience.

Applicants must submit with their applications a report on one of several topics listed in the examination announcement, dealing with warehousing. Age limits, 18 to 62, are waived for persons entitled to veteran preference.

Further information may be obtained from the Commission's local secretary, H. N. Yardley, at the College Station Post Office. Applications must be received in the Commission's Office, Washington, D. C., not later than February 17.

publication appeared under the name of Reveille, but in the next school year the name Daily Bulletin was reassumed. There were four pages, about a quarter the size of standard newspaper pages. Copies were distributed free to all students, faculty members and residents of College Station. A few ads were accepted.

In June of 1928, the Daily Bulletin ceased. However, the official notices columns and the What's Cooking column in the current Batts are heritages from the Bulletin.

Magazines Started  
 A Student Activities Committee not the present Student Activities Office but a predecessor of the present Student Life Committee took over publication of The Battalion in 1928. Ambitious plans were made to put new life into the weekly paper, which had once again fallen into hard times.

Publication of a monthly magazine, under the auspices and editorship of the newspaper staff, started in 1930. At times the magazine became almost independent of the newspaper in fact, though originally it was "substituted" once a month for one of the weekly issues. When talent was available, the magazine sparkled, usually as a one-man show, as during the editorship of Pete Timlinson. When first-rate talent disappeared in 1943, the magazine disappeared too.

A Faculty Publication Committee was established in 1929, but without the power of censorship. Since that time, editors may be held liable after publication of actionable material, but publications are not faculty-reviewed in advance.

Sometime in the 20's, a typographical error caused a mixup in volume numbers which has never been successfully corrected. From Volume 30, the Batt slipped back to Volume 21, and started repeating. Some adjustments were tried, but not satisfactorily, and the volume number now, which should be 55, is actually 47.

Technical magazines were revived in 1933. The Countryman and The Technoscope, founded in that year, were merged into The Scientific Review in 1935. Resurrected as The Agriculturalist and The Engineer in 1940. The historical forebears of these publications, The Student Farmer and the Architectural Yearbook, had perished in the First World War. WW II put the Agriculturalist and The Engineer out of publication for a while, but they were revived in 1946.

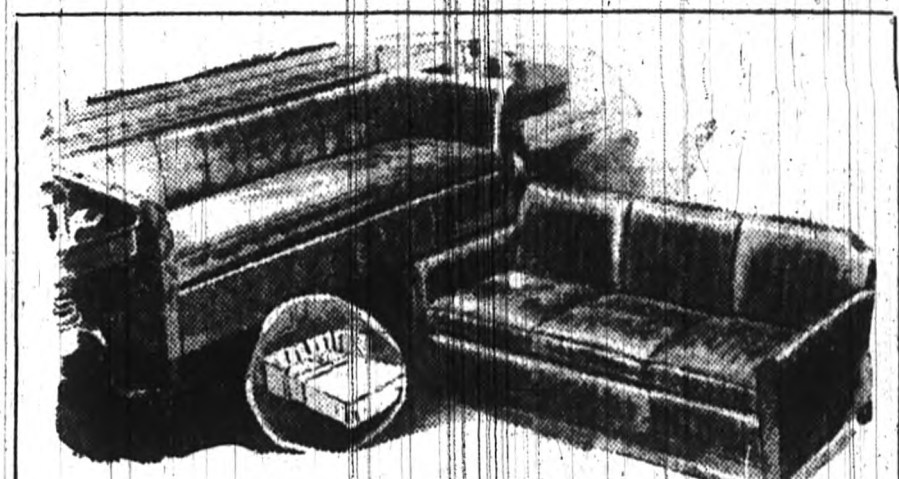
