

'Turn of the Century' Costumes Modeled at Social Club Meeting

A style show featuring costumes of the "Turn of the Century" highlighted the College Woman's Social Club Friday afternoon in the YMCA.

Mrs. G. W. Schlesselman, who acted as narrator, told the history of every costume worn. She stated that although worn during the "Turn of the Century" were of "extraordinary elegance," since that was a period during which clothing design reached a peak of perfection.

Mrs. M. T. Harrington, program chairman, wore the wedding gown of Mrs. A. B. Hamm of Fort Worth. Mrs. Hamm, sister of President

Gibb Gilchrist, wore the dress in 1896.

Mrs. D. B. Cofer wore a grandmother's costume of the period, while Mrs. Robert V. Andrews wore a reproduction of the wedding dress of Mrs. H. E. Callender's mother. Mrs. Schlesselman's dress of green and tan wool belonged to the Harrington family.

Mesdames Cofer, Andrews and Schlesselman composed the program committee and were introduced by Mrs. Harrington.

Mrs. F. W. Hensel who presented the music for the program wore a dress brought from Paris by Mrs. M. W. Sims in 1900.

Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Ervin sang two groups of Gay Ninety songs. Included were Moonlight and Roses, Londonderry Air, and Bicycle Built for Two. Ervin's costume was a Prince Albert coat worn by Dr. R. P. Marsteller in 1900.

Mrs. Frank Anderson and son Wally wore the wedding clothes

of Mrs. Anderson's parents. The wedding took place in 1890.

Mrs. E. H. Murphy wore the 70 year old wedding dress of Joe Mogford's mother.

pressure drop below the normal output of 125,000 pounds of pressure per hour.

During the next 38 hours these boilers burned over 30,000 gallons of the reserve oil.

This was the longest period of time that the boilers were ever operated on the fuel oil reserve since they were converted to use gas in 1937. The last time the reserve was used in 1944, when it was necessary to utilize this fuel oil for a 4 hour period.

Hines has been with the college as supervisor of the power plant since 1927, when he came here from the Texas Power and Light Company. It was under his direction that the General Electric Turbo-Generators, which have served the college since 1930, were installed. His long background in power plant work, covering 32 years, is in a large measure responsible for the efficient and orderly manner in which campus utilities are disbursed.

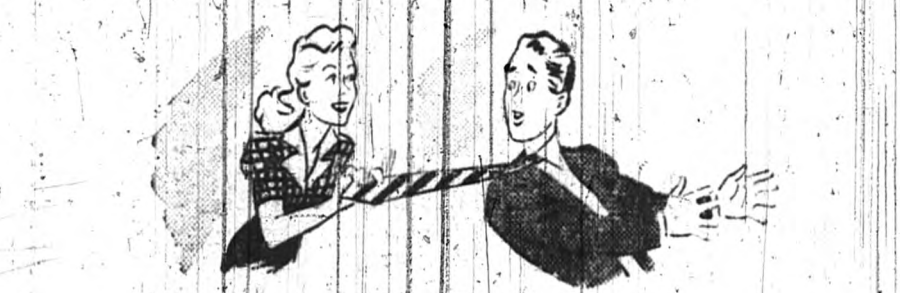
