"Where I erred was in assuming that the joint committee of the legislature would make an honest attempt at finding out the facts, instead of expecting me to develop them myself. A committee of that kind, clothed with the power of subpoena could, if they had to do so, have revealed many things which were not available to me. My reliance would of necessity have been on voluntary sources of information unless I had chosen to ask for a grand jury investigation."

"The persons from whom the information had to be secured must have felt that their very livelihood would have been at stake if it had become known that they had furnished me with the information which the committee expected me to furnish."

"I doubt that I would have acted differently if I had known in advance the kind of treatment which I was to receive at the hands of the committee. At any rate I should have known better than to have trusted my destiny to the tender mercies of an investigation committee of any legislative body."

"They (investigating committee) seemed determined if possible to discredit me by making me say something which might be interpreted as an admission on my part of my inability to substantiate my charges. There was undoubtedly conscious effort on the part of certainly the chairman of the committee to do exactly that. And I was unable to discover very much evidence of anything else on the part of other members of the committee."

"By deduction, therefore, my conclusion is that the reference to my admission of inability to substantiate charges is something which the chairman of the committee by subterfuge induced me to say so as to create the impression fraudulently. I think, that I had admitted my inability to substantiate my charges."
