The purpose of the program is to
offer any boy with a good scholastic record and in need of financial,
assistance, a chance to win his
own college education.
The Texas A&M Opportunity
Awards program, which was instigated in 1946, offers high school
eraduates an opportunity to com-

graduates an opportunity to compete for four-year scholarships paying \$200 to \$300 per year. The scholarships also guarantee student jobs sufficient to earn other necessary expenses. Scholarship, character, evidence

of leadership, and need of assist-ance are the points on which final winners are selected by the college committee. Application blanks may be secured from high school principals and must be filled out and returned to the college committee by March 15

The finalists are entitled to compete in an examination to be held at the college May 1 and 2 Winners will be named on the basis of this examination.

The scholarship awards, which are provided for by gifts of fermer students, have increased in num-ber from sixteen in 1946 to twenty eight for 1948.

The Veterans Administration also called attention to the fact that a veteran wishing to transfer to another institution and still receive benefits of the GI Bill must obtain approval for the change from the VA Regional Office or VA training officer.

Though there is usually no objection to veterans' changing schools, however, notices should be given in advance of the contemplated change if delays are to be prevented, the Veterans Administration added.


