

State Republican Committee Denounces Civil Rights Act

HOUSTON, Tex., Feb. 17 (AP)—A sharp denunciation of President Truman's proposed "civil rights" legislation was voted unanimously by the Republican State Executive Committee at its meeting here yesterday.

The committee selected Corpus Christi as the site for its state presidential convention on May 25.

Col. R. B. Creager of Brownsville, national Republican committeeman from Texas since 1929, offered the resolution to condemn the president's request for legislation outlawing lynching, poll tax requirements, the so-called Fair Employment Practices Commission and the "Jim Crow" segregation laws in the south.

Col. Creager, kingpin of Texas Republicans, had just been given a unanimous vote of confidence by the Executive Committee.

The Creager resolution termed the proposed Federal legislation a violation of local self government and state's rights, and a dangerous increase in the powers of the Federal government. Such legislation would increase and enhance racial feelings in the south without achieving the slightest beneficial advantage, the resolution said.

In a speech from the floor on the resolution, Orville Bullington of Wichita Falls, a former Democrat, said the requested legislation raises the most dangerous question on the racial issue since the war between the states.

He claimed that the South has done more for the colored people than any other section of the country. He charged that the request for the legislation is for "political and rotten purposes, an attempt to get the Harlem vote."

Bullington declared, "I am a Southerner before I am an American and I am a Texan before I am a Southerner."

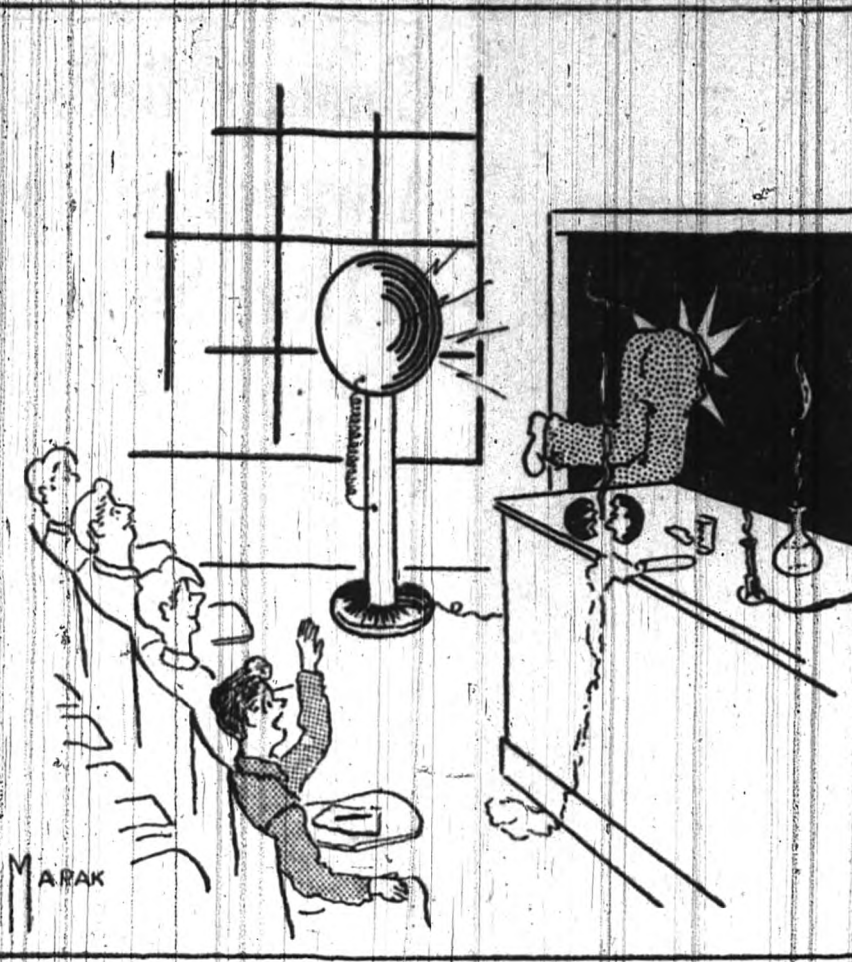
The application for a place on the Democratic party ballot was filed with R. W. Calvert, chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

The Aggieband Orchestra plays for the Cotton Ball and Pageant on APRIL 16 and for all-college dance which completes the week-end on APRIL 17.

This will be the scene of the Freshman Ball on APRIL 24. Festivities for the following week end begin with the Second Regimental Ball on Friday, APRIL 30, and the May Day Ball greets spring the following night.

Date for the Senior Ring Dance has been changed to MAY 14, and an all-college dance has been set for MAY 15. Orchestras for these events have not been selected.

The Final Ball will be held on Friday, JUNE 4. The orchestra selected will be announced later.
