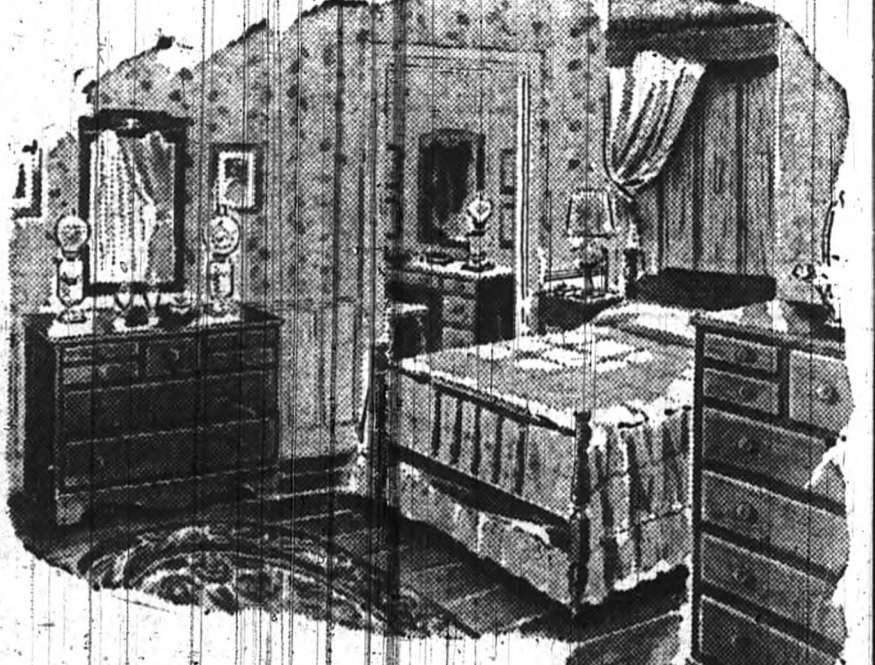

## Company Representatives Will Interview Seniors, March 2-4

Six companies will have representatives on the campus this week to interview seniors, Director W. R. Horsley of the Placement Office announced today.

Tuesday, March 2, Aetna Casualty and Surety Company will interview business and accounting, economics, agricultural economics, and industrial education majors.

A representative of the Texas Company will be at the Placement Office Tuesday and Wednesday to interview mechanical, electrical, civil, chemical, and petroleum engineers, and chemists for research and development, engineering, and processing positions.

The Chrysler Airtemp Sales Corporation will have an agent on the campus Wednesday to interview prospective mechanical and electrical engineers for air conditioning work.

Also on Wednesday, there will be a representative of the Amerada Petroleum Company to speak with mechanical, electrical and civil engineers, mathematicians, and geologists for exploration work.

On March 3-4 Phillips Petroleum Company will have a representative on the campus. He will interview prospective mechanical, electrical, petroleum, architectural, civil, and geological engineers for production, exploration, engineering, research and development, sales, and refining positions.

Southern Alkali Corporation will send a representative to the campus on Thursday to interview chemical engineers for placement in the technical department for training.

Seniors who are interested in obtaining interviews with any of the representatives should make appointments in the Placement Office Horsley said. However, he warned, seniors wishing interviews must have registration records on file in his office.

## 'Texas Day' Is Women's Social Club Theme at Friday Meeting

"Texas Day" was the theme of the College Women's Social Club Friday afternoon in Sbisla Hall.

Mrs. Ralph Steen, speaking on the "Shrine of Texas," said that on the long road from wilderness to modern Texas, certain milestones marked events of outstanding importance. These milestones are the shrines of Texas, which, in one sense, Mrs. Steen said, may be called the "shrine of freedom."

Speaking on "Social Life and Customs of Early Texas," Mrs. Horace Bass said, "It would be impossible to account for many customs peculiar to Texas without knowing something of the mode of living and social practices during the days of the Republic, and even before that time."

"Behind the greatness of Texas today is the story of a people who suffered untold hardships, and bitter disappointments to build our state," Mrs. Bass said.

She concluded her talk by introducing the square dance exhibition group led by Lee Thompson. Thompson said that square dancing has been popular in Texas since early days, sometimes under the name of barn dancing or country-style dancing.

Dr. and Mrs. C. B. Campbell spoke on the early days at A&M. She said that factors weighing in the selection of the present site for A&M were that it was a great distance from city temptations, it was a population center of Texas, it was believed that if an agricultural student could make things grow in the poor soil near here that he could make a living anywhere, and that it was near a railroad.

A&M had its first session in 1874 with two buildings, six students, and six faculty members—the only time an adequate number of faculty has ever been provided, Mrs. Campbell said.

In closing, she stated that A&M has since grown from an investment of about \$108,000 to a great institution with a plant now valued at over \$119,000,000.

The March meeting of the club has been postponed until April 2, it was announced, so as not to conflict with Easter holidays.

Virginia Mae Prewitt was chosen to represent the Social Club as duchess at the 14th annual Cotton Ball and Pageant. Petty Potter is first alternate and Anna Jean Godby, second alternate.

## Cadet Corps To Parade March 2 In 'New' Area

The Cadet Corps will hold its third formal Corps Parade of the year, Tuesday afternoon at 5:35 on the Infantry Drill Field.

All members of the corps except for the military residents of Hart Hall will participate in the review, according to the order issued by Cadet Colonel of the Corps, William L. Brown.

The official uniform will be the number one woolen, with helmet liners, boots, and sabers. Colors and guidons will be carried.

Previous corps parades this year have been held in honor of General Thomas T. Handy, commanding general of the Fourth Army, and as presentation ceremonies for the awards given by the Houston Chamber of Commerce's Military Affairs Committee.

The parade, originally scheduled for the Main Drill Field, was changed this morning for the Infantry Drill Field behind Duncan Hall.

Individual units will be graded on their military performance during the parade, and credit will be given toward the General George F. Moore Trophy, and the Houston Chamber of Commerce's Military Affairs Committee award for the most military proficient unit.

The Corps will form in the New Area with units in a six man front. Color guards will be furnished by the units as previously designated.

## Hillel Speaker Says Palestine Problem Great

"Palestine's problem is the world's problem—world peace depends upon its solution," Baron Hans De Meiss-Teffen said before an audience in the YMCA Friday night.

Stressing the clash between the Arabian upper classes and immigrant Jews, Meiss-Teffen said the struggle now going on in Palestine was primarily between a minority of immigrant Jews on one hand, and radical Arab students and unemployed on the other.

Baron Meiss-Teffen gained first hand experience in Palestine by working as a common laborer on Jewish construction projects. He has not only garnered information from mingling with Arabs and Jews in their native land but has also gained a broader view of the question by association with the British and other nationalities concerned with the problem.

Only about 27% of the land in the Jewish portion of Palestine is now owned by the Jews, Meiss-Teffen continued. The rest is owned by upper class Arabs. Jews fired with patriotic zeal are now reclaiming the once unproductive land and making it bloom, he said.

Not only are the Jews making progress, but also they are instilling a desire for progress in the Arabs who are held down by a minority from their own upper class, Meiss-Teffen said.

Meiss-Teffen concluded that it was up to the United States, as the strongest nation in the world, to see that justice is done in Palestine. Until the Jews control Palestine, there will never be world peace, he said.
