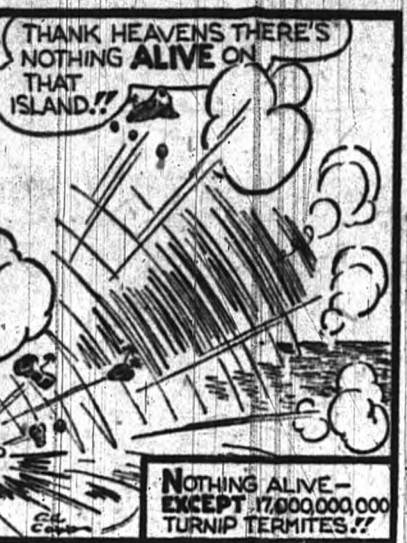
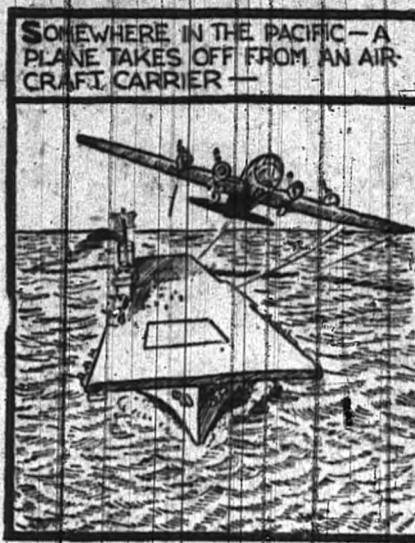

Education Bill Would Benefit Texans by \$11.90

WASHINGTON, April 7.—(AP)—The Federal Aid to Education Bill passed by the Senate and awaiting final action in the House, would be a big help in financing of local school systems in Texas.

Out of a general appropriation of \$300,000,000 a year authorized by the measure, starting July 1, Texas would receive approximately \$11.90 per student between the ages of 5 and 17.

An idea of how Texas would fare under the formula: Minnesota would get \$5.10 per student and Mississippi, \$28.50. In 25 states there would be a flat allotment of \$5 per pupil.

The measure would NOT interfere with the states in operation of their own school systems. Many southern legislators were worried at first that the bill could not be passed without granting the Federal Government power in such matters as race segregation. But no such restrictions have been written into it.

sors should share the knowledge of teaching with younger staff members. Dr. Haskew pointed out the methods of improving lecture techniques of professors that have been used at Harvard. There, according to Dr. Haskew, transcriptions of lectures were made and then the professor was given the opportunity to hear his own lecture. Other professors listened and made comments on the techniques and illustrations used.

The hallmark of good teaching, stated Dr. Haskew, is a live, genuine, intellectual curiosity developed in the student by the teacher who has shifted his teaching methods so that he might find the best method of imparting knowledge to a student.

Dr. Haskew urged professors to do more research out of intellectual curiosity. He suggested that this research not be confined to new fields, but rather for teachers to concentrate on the unknown sectors of knowledge already gained. He urged a pooling of knowledge of psychology, sciences, and humanity to arrive at new truths about man.
