A&M Garden Club Hears Talk On Flower Arrangement Show

Members of the A&M Garden Club and their guests heard Mrs. Charles F. Steineger of Dallas talk on flower arrangement and flower show practice Monday afternoon in the YMCA Chapel.

"People can do as they please with flowers in the home—

crum them in a pitcher of what-not if that is the way they like flowers most," said Mrs. Steineger, a nationally accredited judge and lecturer on flower arrangement. "In a flower show, you are given a schedule and you select the groups in which you want to make entries; then you make an arrangement using the flowers, foliage, container, and holder."

Mrs. Steineger said that flower arrangement is recognized as one of the fine arts today. A few people can arrange flowers naturally just as some play music "by ear." Principles used today in making flower arrangements are based on the centuries of study by orientals in line arrangements and occidentals who specialize in masses of flowers.

There are certain requirements of good arrangements, Mrs. Steineger continued. Balance, either symmetrical or by placement, har-
