Student Parking Lot For Boomtown Area Is Opened

A new parking area for students has been opened in Boomtown, Fred Hickman, chief of campus security, announced yesterday. Students are requested to use the west side of the new lot.

Employees of the College have been provided with parking areas in the vicinity of the buildings in which they work. Hickman stated that students are allowed two tickets or more before they are called up for the first time and that more stress is placed on speeding than on parking. Students are reminded that the speed limit on the campus is 20 miles per hour.

 Hart: Parking area behind Hart Hall.
 Bizzell: Parking area south of Main Drill Field.
 Puryear, Law: Parking area west and north of Law Hall.
 Leggett and Mitchell Milner Hall: Parking area north of Milner and east of Sbsa Hall.

current crop of purely technical engineers and what can be done and what is being done to broaden them mentally.

Editor Paul Cretien goes into the agricultural field with an article on migratory crop workers and what the Extension Service is doing to aid them. Bob Polson, employs mathematics, economics, and philosophy to ascertain the date of the next depression and comes up with the conclusion that in 1952 we had best look to our apples and shoestrings.

Cartoonists offer some food for thought on the UMT issue with a two-page group of ideas on what the program could and might be like. The comparisons are painfully possible.

The "Visions of Swedenborg" are adapted to verse by Vick Lindley. It's interesting to note that Swedenborg was an early engineer who delved into calculus and immediately thereafter had a vision of the tortures of Hell.

Concluding feature is one concerning Dr. Joseph Stadelmann and his basic language "Voldu."

This issue of the Commentator covers a broader field of subject matter than any of the previous editions. Material is for the most part pertinent and well presented. Main distraction from the magazine's appearance is again the lack of page lustre.

Several of the pages resolve down into two long columns of print and could stand breaking up by shorter paragraphs, bolder sub-titles, or a use of column ads.

Overall this month's Commentator typifies A&M's student magazines. Due to a time and help shortage they aren't pushing the "New Yorker" in make-up, but for content and cover they are right up front in the collegiate field.

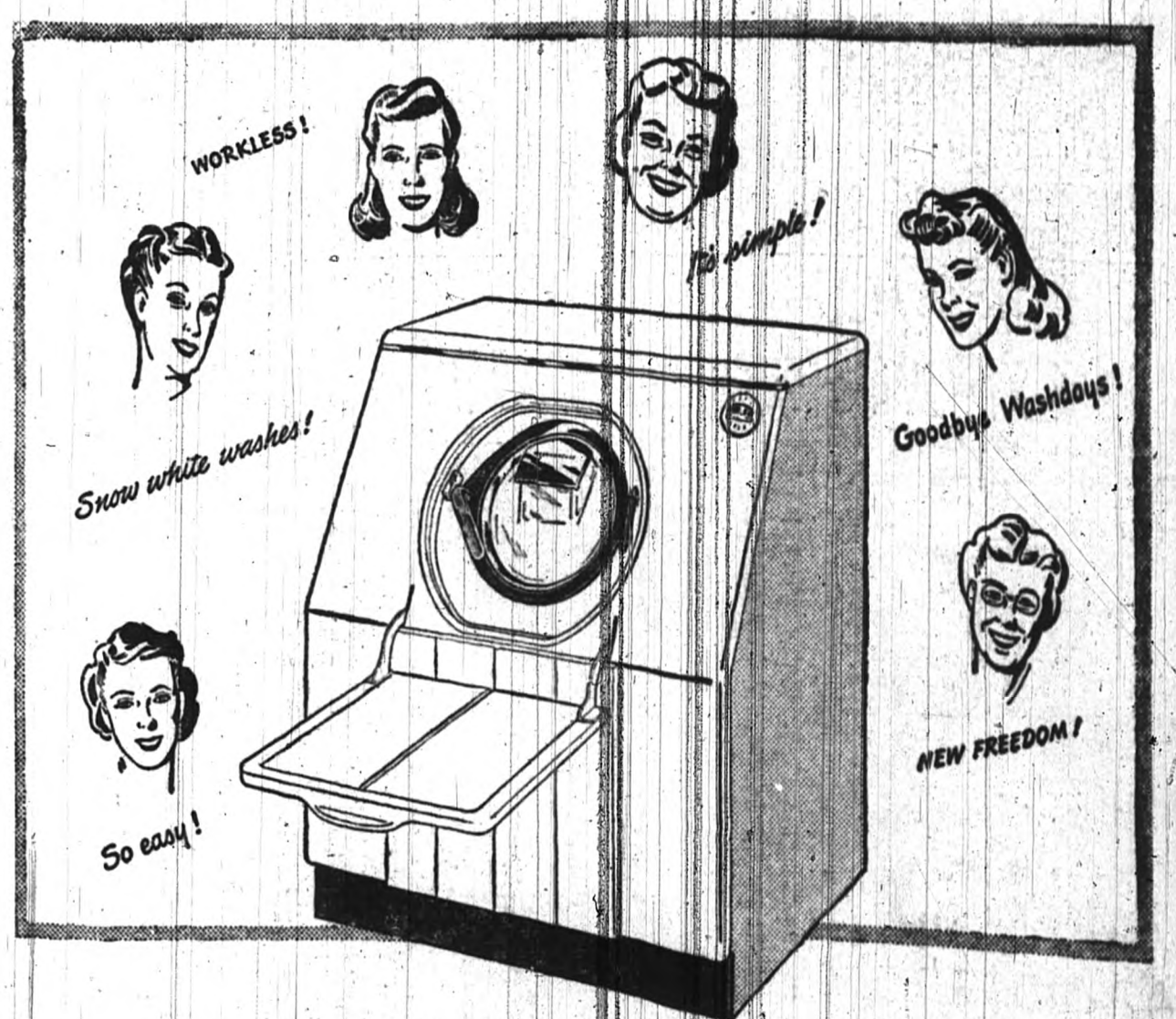
