For the second starts the Texas A&M Tennis team defeated the Sam Houston Cougers Monday afternoon at Navasota. The netmen from Aggieland


were masters of the courts all the way and won the match in straight sets with a score of 6-0. The Ag-gies won their first tilt from the Cougers by the same score.


