VOTERS OF A&M CONSOLIDATED

At a meeting on April 17, the Board of Trustees of the A&M Consolidated Independent School District received 25 petitions signed by 307 voters of the District, requesting the School Board to call an election in the District for the purpose of taking action on the following propositions:
FIRST: To bring the school tax rate limit up to the legally authorized figure of \$1.50, as so many other Texas schools have already done.
SECOND: To authorize the School Board to issue bonds up to a total of \$125,000 to finance construction and repair of additional classrooms to meet the expanding needs of a growing community.
The School Board has ordered the election, and the date is set for **SATURDAY, MAY 1.** Every qualified voter of the District should go to the polls and vote, as no issue is more vital to this community than the one to be decided by this election. College Station is the home of a great institution of higher learning, and it now becomes a question of whether our public schools in the District shall suffer by comparison.
