necessary in preparing and showing an animal in a dairy cattle exhibition.

The annual spring dairy cattle show is sponsored jointly by the Kream and Kow Klub, which was organized in 1924, and the Dairy Husbandry Department. A. L. Darnell, professor of dairy husbandry, is in charge of the show. D. C. Marsh, also a professor in the Dairy Husbandry Department, is the faculty sponsor of the Kream and Kow Klub.

Approximately 40 animals will be exhibited this year in the following classes: junior heifers, senior heifer calves, junior yearling heifers, and senior yearling heifers. A sub-class of young bulls will be shown but will not be judged. The dairy animals will consist of both the Jersey and the Holstein breeds.

Both the Murphy menfolk are looking forward to 1 p. m. May 1, when the judging is scheduled to get underway. They hope experience will tell.

Never the Twain Shall Meet

(Not Conrad Twiggins) Hick Bindley, editor of "The Duncanville Daily Disgrace," sat slouched in his swivel chair. His feet were propped up on the antique roll-top desk which was cluttered with clippings, paste, and several volumes of Shakespeare. A foul-smelling, oversized meerschaum pipe was clamped firmly between Hick's teeth and a well-chewed, black pencil protruded from behind his right ear.

Ah, yes, Hick presented the perfect picture of a crusading journalist. And a crusading journalist he was, too.

Hick had started his crusading as a staff member of The Battalion, the official publication of Texas A&M College and College Station, Texas. It was Hick's policy, even then, to print what he thought the readers should have. To give the subscribers what they wanted was childish and showed lack of character.

One could say lots of nasty things about Hick, but no one could say that he lacked character. That

is, character of a certain kind. As a matter of fact, Hick had more character than gray matter. The community had plenty of cotton, corn, turkeys, and boll weevils, but was short on culture.

So, Hick had given them culture. He had published quotes from Shakespeare and quips from Swedenborg. He had given front page spreads to book reviews, and he had announced the piano recital of a local long-hair in two-inch headlines. But Hick had failed to publish a Department of Agriculture warning that an army of radio active turnip termites was moving in on Duncanville after its conquest of Dogpatch. The farmers, unaware of this approaching disaster, were not prepared when these starving, turnip-loving insects attacked their precious crops.

make other formerly impossible investigations. Dr. Potter has a B. S. degree from Princeton, an M. S. from New York, and Ph.D. from Yale. First teaching on the faculty at Illinois Institute of Technology, he later became head of the South Dakota School of Mines and Technology. During the war he worked on the electronic investigation in the Bell Telephone Laboratories. In 1945 he came to A&M to head the physics department.

Friday, Paul M. Andrews, instructor of physical education, will discuss the characteristics of good hitters in the world of baseball. He will discuss the value and importance of good hitting, the time and practice required to perfect good batting technique, and the necessity for observing fundamentals such as the selection of the proper bat, the proper grip, and stance, and the place to connect with the ball.

Andrews first came to A&M in 1943, following a year in professional baseball with the Gulf Coast League. He attended Thorpe's Springs Junior College, later taking his B. The movie has been shown in Dallas, Fort Worth, and Lubbock, where the proceeds went to the A&M scholarship fund.

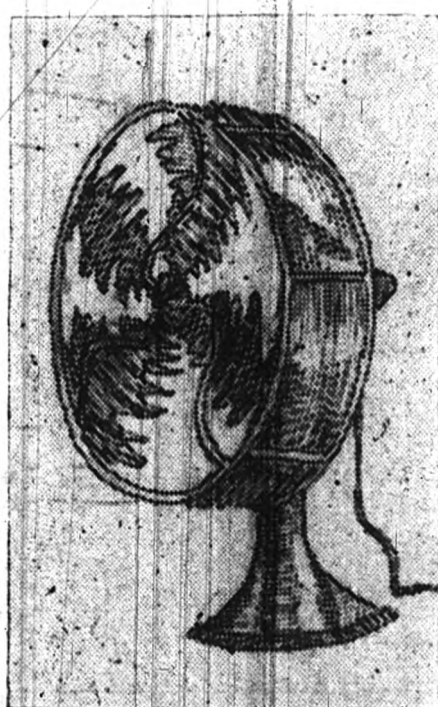
An Aggie Class of '22, McMillan played football three years. He made his latest trip to Africa last November where he spent nearly six months filming African wildlife.
