Stark Attends Student Union Directors Meet

The celebration, being held April 29 through May 1 at the Hotel Roanoke, will be attended by about 250 student union directors from colleges in the United States and Canada.

Speakers for the three-day affair include G. Ott Romney, dean of the school of physical education at West Virginia University; Dr. Dabney S. Lancaster, president of Virginia Teachers College; and Dr. Francis P. Brown, executive secretary of the American Council on Education.

Principal speaker for the Friday night banquet will be Dr. Frank P. Graham, president of the University of North Carolina.

Following the business sessions Saturday afternoon, a trip will be made to Virginia's natural bridge, Virginia Military Institute, and Washington and Lee University. A visit will also be made by the union directors to Thomas Jefferson's home at Monticello and the Smoky Mountains.

The Association of College Unions was formed in 1919, but did not meet during the war years. Stark plans to return to College Station Sunday night.

Thirty-eight Extension Service specialists from Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Texas are meeting on the campus April 26 through May 6 for an Intra-regional Workshop for Extension Subject Matter Specialists.

G. G. Gibson, A&M extension dairy specialist, is chairman of the steering committee. J. D. Prewitt, acting director of the Texas Extension Service, opened the workshop Monday with a talk on "What We Expect The Workshop To Accomplish."

Gibson followed Prewitt on the program with "Organization and Workshop Procedures." "Extension's Opportunities" was the subject of J. L. Boatman's talk. Boatman is chief of the division of subject matter, Extension Service, USDA.

Other speakers and their subjects on the first days program were: "How We Decide What To Do—Program Development" by Charles A. Sheffield, Extension Service field agent, USDA; "Analyzing a Local Situation" by K. F. Warner, meat specialist of the Extension Service, USDA; and "Effective Methods of Education" by John R. Bertrand, assistant to the dean of agriculture of A&M.

Yesterday's program included Louis Franke, Texas Extension editor, who spoke on "Teaching Materials That Fit The Situation"; "Relationships of Specialists in Cooperative Extension Work" by S. P. Lyle, in charge of the agricultural section of the Federal Extension Service; and K. F. Warner's talk on "How to Put On A Demonstration."

Speakers scheduled for the remainder of the workshop program include: Miss Mary Louise Collins, division of field studies and training, Extension Service, USDA; D. S. Lantrip, Arkansas state 4-H Club Agent; and Mrs. Eloise T. Johnson, A&M extension family life education specialist.

Also listed are: Dr. H. G. Johnston, A&M extension entomologist; Miss Mena Hogan, Extension Service field agent, USDA; Dr. Paul J. Kruss, department of rural education at Cornell University; and Miss Helen Swift, extension sociologist, rural women's organization; Tyrus R. Timm, A&M extension economist; and J. D. 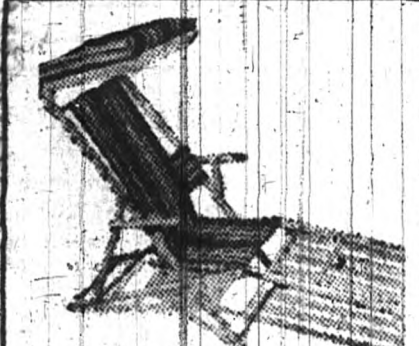
