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June Graduates From 26 States Four Countries

Twenty-six states other than Texas and four foreign countries are represented by students applying for degrees at the June commencement.

Among the 907 June graduates are 93 students on the out-of-state

list and eight students on the foreign countries list. There are 806 applicants from Texas.

The foreign countries represented are Puerto Rico, 3; Mexico, 3; Venezuela, 1, and Canal Zone, 1.

Out-of-states are: Arkansas, 7; Illinois, 4; Oklahoma, 10; Mississippi, 6; Washington, 1; Kansas, 3; Georgia, 1; Washington, D. C., 3; Louisiana, 28; Virginia, 1; New Jersey, 4; Oregon, 1; New Mexico, 1; California, 3; Kentucky, 1; North Carolina, 1; Pennsylvania, 4; Maine, 2; Missouri, 5; Indiana, 4; Maryland, 1; Tennessee, 2; Ohio, 1; Michigan, 1; Iowa, 1.

Report Presented to AAUP On Aid to Higher Education Plan

The A&M chapter of the American Association of University Professors was recently given a partial report on the work of a commission named by President Truman in 1946, to study and examine the functions of higher education, and the means by which they can best be performed.

Professor M. S. Brooks, of the agricultural economics and sociology department, in his report, said that the goals given are: education for a fuller realization of democracy in every phase of living; education directly and explicitly for international understanding and cooperation; and education for the application of creative imagination and trained intelligence to the solution of social problems and to the administration of public affairs.

Brooks' report emphasized that the development of personal qualities "in our education for democratic living cannot be left as heretofore to some courses or a few departments or extra curricula organizations. It must become a part of every phase of college life."

"The curricula task of higher education today is to provide a unified general education for American youth and strike a balance between specialized training and cultural training for common citizenship."

Professor L. E. Grandi of the electrical engineering department spoke on "Financing and Providing Facilities for Higher Education." He said that the commission predicts 4,900,000 students in college in 1960.

The commission's recommendation was summarized as follows: "High school education for all normal youth, two years of college education should be as common as high school is now, financial aid must be provided for education from tenth grade through junior college; lower cost for students in the senior colleges; adult education to be provided for those who want it; public education must be provided for all alike."

Professor S. H. Hopkins of the biology department summarized the commission's report on "Stratifying Higher Education." This report was concerned with the number of faculty needed.

What's Cooking?

He pointed out that "we had 155,000 college teachers in 1945 and would need 350,000 by 1950. This increased demand for teachers is due to new types of courses," he said, "increased college enrollment and special services to be rendered in our educational programs."

The commission recommended internship training for college teachers similar to internships for medical doctors, Hopkins said. Higher salaries, lighter teaching loads, leaves and exchange professorships were recommended.
