Pat Hubert of the Aggies pitched a six hit game and gave only three free trips on walks. The more famous moundsman of the orange and white allowed seven walks and those were usually at crucial times in the ball same.

Both hurlers struck out seven men. Womack got five of his in the first six men up.

The leading Aggie batters of the day were McPherson. Graham, and Taylor; all simped out two hits in four times at bat. Warriner and Wallace connected for the other two lifes.
