## Aggies Hosts to Oklahoma A&M in Dual Meet Saturday

With only two dual meets on the schedule before the Southwest Conference Meet in Houston May 14-15, the Texas Aggie track squad is working with serious determination in order to prepare themselves for the defense of their Conference Crown.

The first of the two remaining dual meets is slated for tomorrow afternoon on Kyle Field with the Oklahoma Aggies, Champions of the Missouri Valley Conference.

"I expect Oklahoma A&M to bring their complete track squad to Aggie land for Saturday's meet which means they will have good entries in every event," Col. Frank Anderson, Aggie track coach, stated yesterday.

Maurice Fugay, ace Cowboy sprinter, and Max Tarrant durable half-miler, are two of the standouts on the Okie squad.

Last year the Cowboys stopped Texas A&M in a similar meet at Stillwater, Oklahoma by a score of 73 to 52.

This year the story should be different for Oklahoma A&M has lost their ace distance man, Jim Teakell. Last year Teakell won both the mile and the two mile runs.

This year the Farmers will probably sweep both of the distance races with Carl Hahn and Joe McGlothlin in the mile and J. D. Hampton, Jerry Bonnen and Royce Raven in the two mile.

Due to the Conference Baseball game with TCU which will also be held on Kyle Field tomorrow afternoon, the field events will start at 1:30 and the running events will start at 2.

The first three men in each event will be awarded points as follows in tomorrow's meet: first place, 5 points, second place, 3 points, and third place 1 point.

This will be the last chance for Aggie track fans to see A&M's finest clads in action on Kyle Field this season. Next week, the Aggies engage Texas University in a dual meet in Austin.

# Fish Take Shorthorns 5 to 2 Behind Pat Hubert; Collects 8 Hits Off Womack

## Hubert Fans 11 Men While Giving Up Only Six Hits

The Aggie freshman baseballers went to Austin yesterday determined to win a baseball game over the Texas Shorthorns. By playing flawless defensive ball and collecting eight hits off the renowned Frank "Pancho" Womack they did win with a final score of 5 to 2.

Pat Hubert of the Aggies pitched a six hit game and gave only three free trips on walks.

The more famous moundman of the orange and white allowed seven walks and those were usually at crucial times in the ball game.

Both hurlers struck out eleven men. Womack got five of his in the first six men up.

The leading Aggie batters of the day were McPherson, Graham, and Taylor; all slugged out two hits in four times at bat. Warriner and Wallace connected for the other two hits.

Both teams played fine ball in the field, the Shorthorns committing only one error. Frank Tilchek, the orange first baseman, dropped a pop from third base what should have been the second out in a double play. With a man up first and second Taylor had popped a grounder to the third baseman, Frank Kana, and then stumbled over his bat on the way to first, out made it anyway.

For the first three innings the outlook of the Aggies was rather poor. After Womack had dumped five of the first six men to face him and held the Aggies' defenseless for the first three innings, the Austin boys took a one run lead in their half of the third off a single, a walk, and another single.

Graham opened the fourth with a double, Wallace walked. Moon sacrificed Graham to third and Wallace to second. McPherson walked to load the bases with one away. Bollman walked to push in a run, Taylor then forced McPherson at third but was safe at first while Wallace scored. The Aggies had scored two runs off one hit, four walks and an error.

McPherson doubled in the sixth and scored on Taylor's singles. Warriner scored in the seventh as Wallace's fly to left field after doubling to right and moving to third on Graham's single. Warriner scored again in the ninth, after walking and moving to second on Graham's walk, when Wallace singled.

The Shorthorns were limited to only one run in the ninth due greatly to a beautiful play by

Wallace Moon in left field. Tilchek, Shorthorn first sacker, smashed a tremendous drive in to deep left field; Moon took one look at the ball and started moving mightily fast away from the diamond. He reached up with the fingers of his gloved hand. Tilchek's slam would have cleared the fence at Kyle Field but as it was he was forced to hold up at second while Womack, who had walked, scored.

The game was hard fought all the way through with neither side sure of victory until the final out.

Credit must be given to the Fish team for playing a fine game against skillful opponents. A little tight in the box at first, the Farmers settled down and made Womack put them over. They took very few cuts at poor balls.

Double rounds of match play were on today's tournament schedule. The 36-hole finals is set for Saturday.

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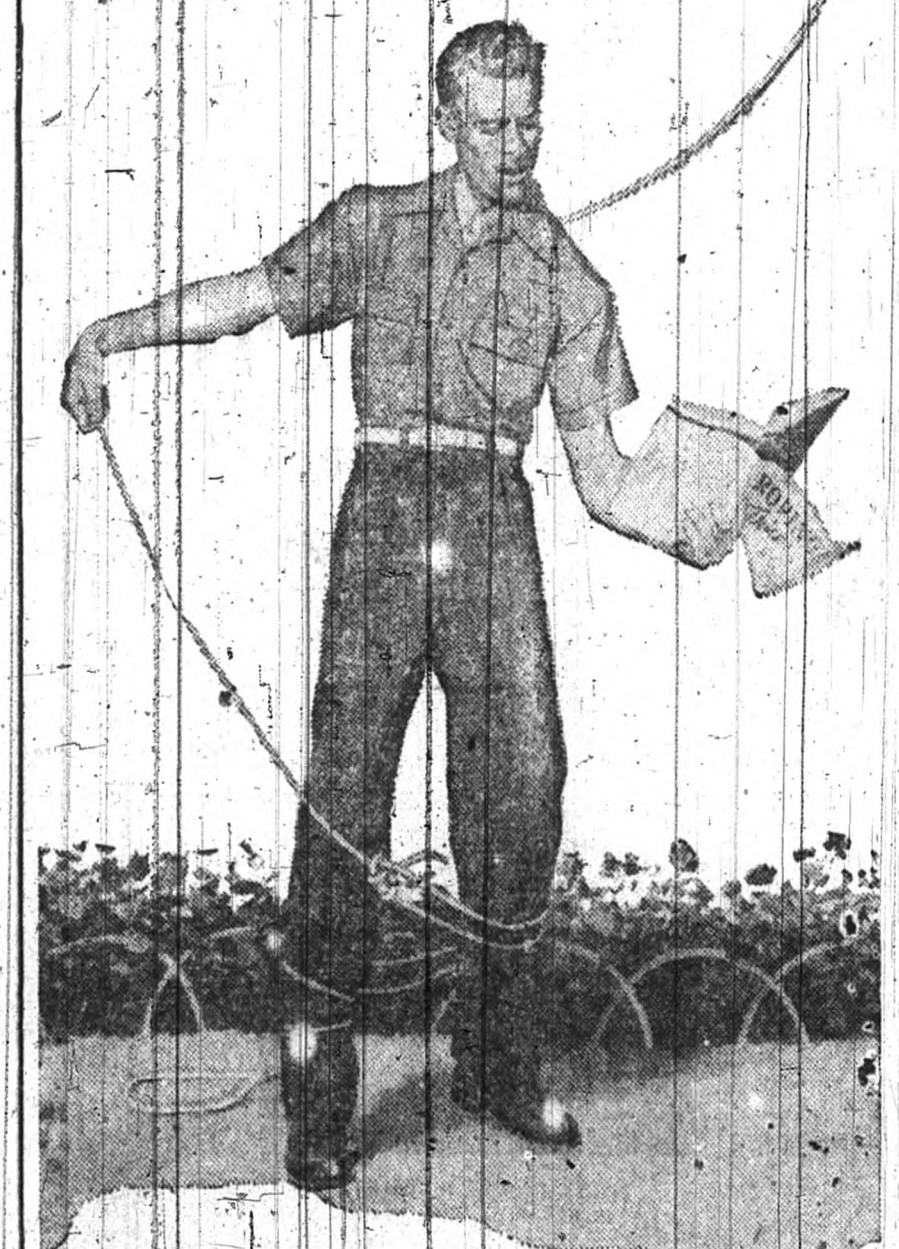
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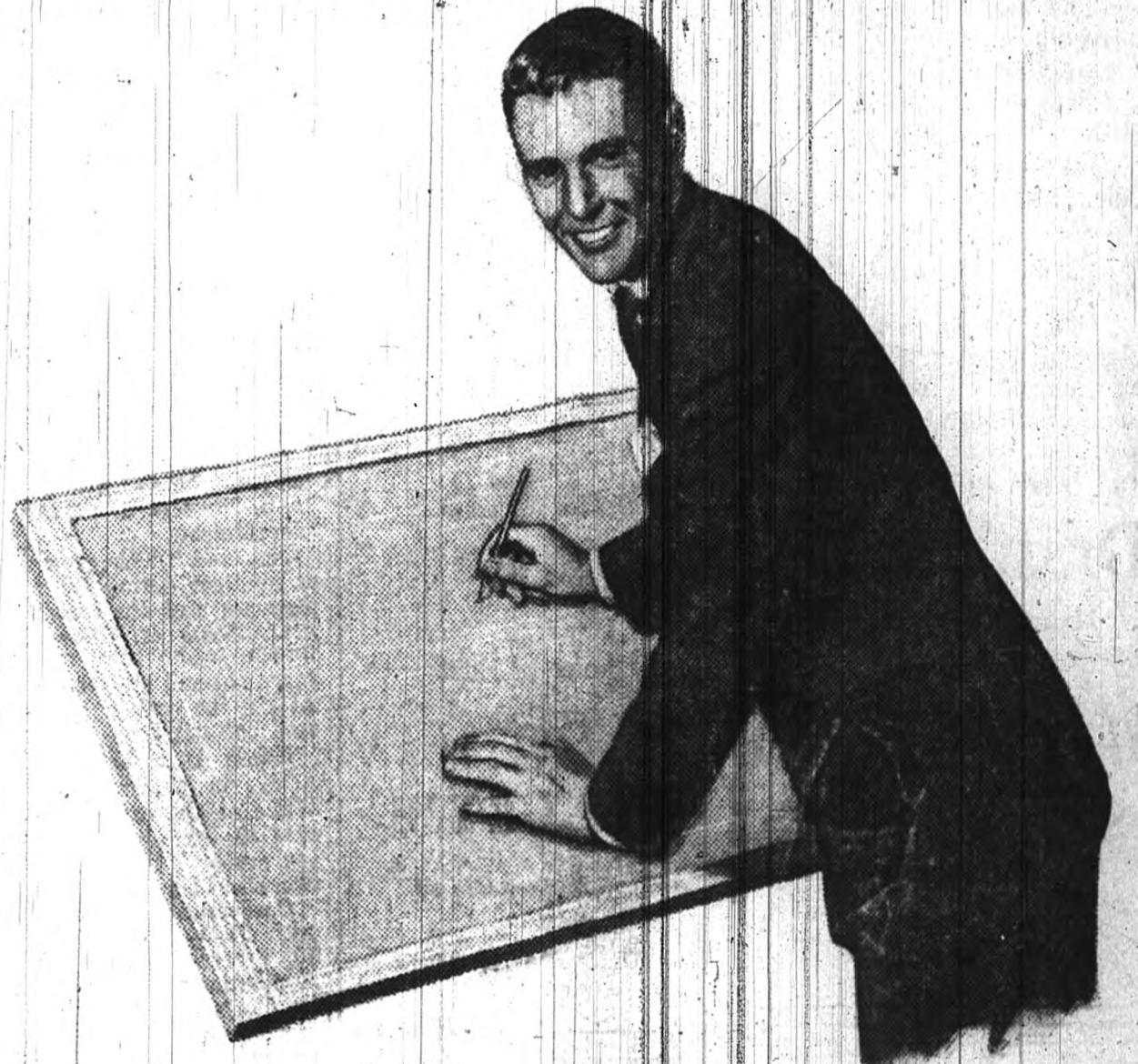
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
