

Aggies Take Series From TCU; Keep Second Place In Conference

Kadera Stars As Farmers Romp To Easy Win Over Oklahoma Trackmen

Wind Helps Aggs To Make Best Marks of Year

The Texas Aggie track team had little trouble in downing the undefeated Oklahoma A&M squad in a dual meet here on Kyle Field last Saturday. The Aggies amassed 96 1/2 points to 39 1/2 for the cowboys.

Big George Kadera, Texas A&M's great weightman, was high point man of the meet. He scored 10 points by virtue of winning the discus throw and the shot put. Kadera's throw in the discus of 175 feet and 1 inch is the best throw that has ever been recorded by a SWC athlete. This throw is nearly ten feet better than the Conference record.

Running with a 15 mile an hour wind at his back, Aggie Bill Napier nipped Oklahoma A&M's ace sprinter, Maurice Fuquay, by a half foot in the 220 yard dash. Napier's time of 20.5 seconds is only .2 of a second off the world's record.

Fuquay, who had earlier nosed out Aggie Webb Jay in a 9.5 hundred, was high point man for the cowboys with 8 points.

In the 220 yard low hurdles Robert Hall of Texas A&M recorded the best time of his career when he won the event in 22.7 seconds.

Other exceptionally good performances by Texas A&M men were turned in by Jim Hill in the broad jump, Franklin Young in the shot put, Bill Gordon in the high hurdles and the sprint relay team.

Hill broad jumped 23 feet 7 1/2 inches for his best jump of the year. John Vought of Oklahoma A&M won the event while Hill was second.

Young, although placing second in the shot behind Kadera, recorded his best put of the year (46 feet 4 inches).

Gordon won the high hurdles in 14.7 and the sprint relay team won

in the good time of 42.1 seconds. Art Harnden, crack quarter-miler who ran with a broken finger, took it easy while placing second behind Ray Holbrook in a 500 second 440.

The strong south wind helped the times of the dash men and the hurdles but the men who had to circle the track were hindered considerably by the strong gale.

The Texas Aggies have only two more meets on their schedule, a dual meet with Texas in Austin this Friday and the Southwest Conference meet in Houston the following week-end.

Hart Hall's 880 yard relay team set a new record in that event with a time of 1:38.2. D Infantry held the old record of 1:39.5. A Infantry took second in this race. The winning team was made up of Green, McKenzie, Lambert, and Dewitt.

TCU Rally Almost Beats Ags Saturday

The Aggies swept themselves solidly into second place in SWC baseball by beating the TCU Horned Frogs, 8 to 3 and 11 to 10 Friday and Saturday on Kyle Field.

In Friday's tilt, the maroon and white coasted in to their victory behind the pitching of Bob Fretz and Earl Beesley. Beesley pitched only the last inning.

Saturday's tilt was a different matter. It was a tough and go affair all through the game. Only the defense told the difference. The Aggies played errorless ball while the Frogs racked up eight bobbles.

Friday A&M tapped the three Frog hurlers, Jim Bishop, Herbert Walters and Tom Bishop, for 12 hits. The Frogs were unable to get any steam until the seventh frame when they pushed their three runs across. Nine hits was all they could gather from Fretz and Beesley. One was a double by Jim Busby, the only Christian extrabase knock.

In the third inning, the Aggie push started. Russell Mays was hit by pitcher Jim Barnett. Cotton Lindloff singled. Aske Strange doubled, scoring Mays but was picked off of second base for an out. Then Stan Hellmig blasted a home run, the ball sailing out into the middle of the football practice field.

The scoring continued in the fourth inning. Dusty Clark singled and went to second on an error by Bill Fullhart, the Horned Frog first-baseman. Bobby Fretz reached first safely on an error by the shortstop, Jim Boyd. Mays doubled, then Lindloff doubled scoring Clark and Fretz. Strange cut loose with a single then to push in Mays and Lindloff.

This coupled with a single run in the second inning iced the game away. The Frogs scored their three runs in the seventh but the Aggies failed to let it bother them. Pitcher Tom Montgomery singled.

Johnny Henry took the lone win for the Farmers when he defeated Razorback Herman Styles in match play.

Travis Bryan, Jr., was upset by Bridges in an 18-hole dual.

Bubba Smart, Arkansas' No. 1 player, defeated Bart Halton. Aggie Jack Barnett also fell before the par shooting of John Mosely.

Smart and Mosely then teamed to beat the visitors in doubles, and Wayne Marks and Bridges stopped Bryan and Henry.

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Steers Swamp Baylor, Rice In Track Meet

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Robert Walters of Texas was a surprise victor in the high jump over Verne McGrew of Rice. Walters cleared 6 feet 6 3/4 inches on his last jump to win the event.

Ken Boren of Texas upset Aggie Erfurth in the 220-low hurdles by six feet. Earlier Erfurth was timed at 14.2 seconds in the highs, and Boren won the lows in 23.8 seconds.

Don Sparks ran away from Jim Hoff of Rice in the last 300 yards of the 880-yard run to win in 1:51.3.

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
