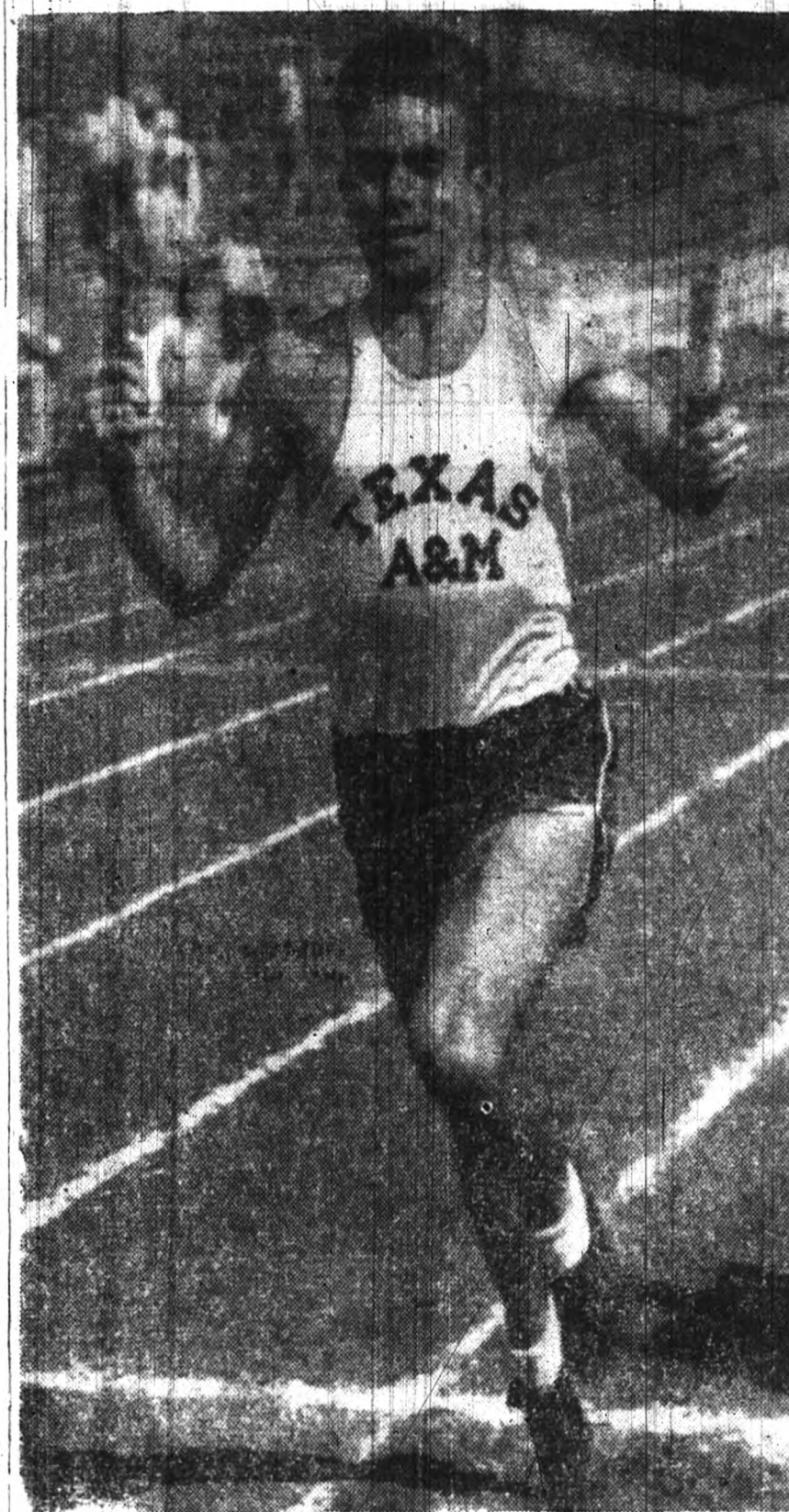
Coach Returns

Texas Aggies Belt Mustangs 9-2

**Strange Sets Pace
With Two Home Runs**



Unloosening a barrage of base hits, the Texas Aggies defeated the SMU Mustangs, 9 to 2 on Kyle Field Monday. It was Earl Beesley's fifth win for the season.

Biggest stick in the Aggie lineup was center fielder Zeke Strange. With a good batting eye, Strange slammed out two home runs. One came in the third after Cotton Lindloff had singled and the other came in the fourth with both Kussel Mays and Lindloff on bases. All totaled, Strange drove in five runs.

Both teams batted around the order before the scoring began. The Aggies gained three runs on Strange's homer in the third.

The Mustangs picked up their only two tallies in the fourth frame. Duke Walker, whose crafty defensive work in center field held down Aggie scoring, got on first on Bobby Fretz's error, then stole second. Walker scored on Danny Lynch's single.

Lynch moved to third in Jerry Jensen's single, then stayed as John Knott hit into a double play. After Beesley grounded out in the fourth, Mays got a base on balls off the new pitcher, George Baker. Baker had replaced starter Irwin Kay. Lindloff walked as Strange brought them in on his second homer. Stan Holmberg doubled and scored on Bobby Fretz's double. The scoring ceased as Thornton struck out and Clark grounded out.

The Mustangs put Beesley in hot water in the seventh inning. Three straight singles by John Ligon, Gene Salmon and Jack Maroney filled the bases with only one out. Then Beesley bled down and fanned pitcher George Baker. Ernie Hughes' infield hit forced Maroney at second to end the threat.

The Mustangs continued to give the Aggies trouble right up to end of the game. In the ninth inning, with one away, John Ligon got on by an error by Ted Thornton. Gene Salmon flew out to Fretz. Then pinch hitter Bill Penn singled.

Joe Willet pitched hard to retire the side while battling for the pitcher.

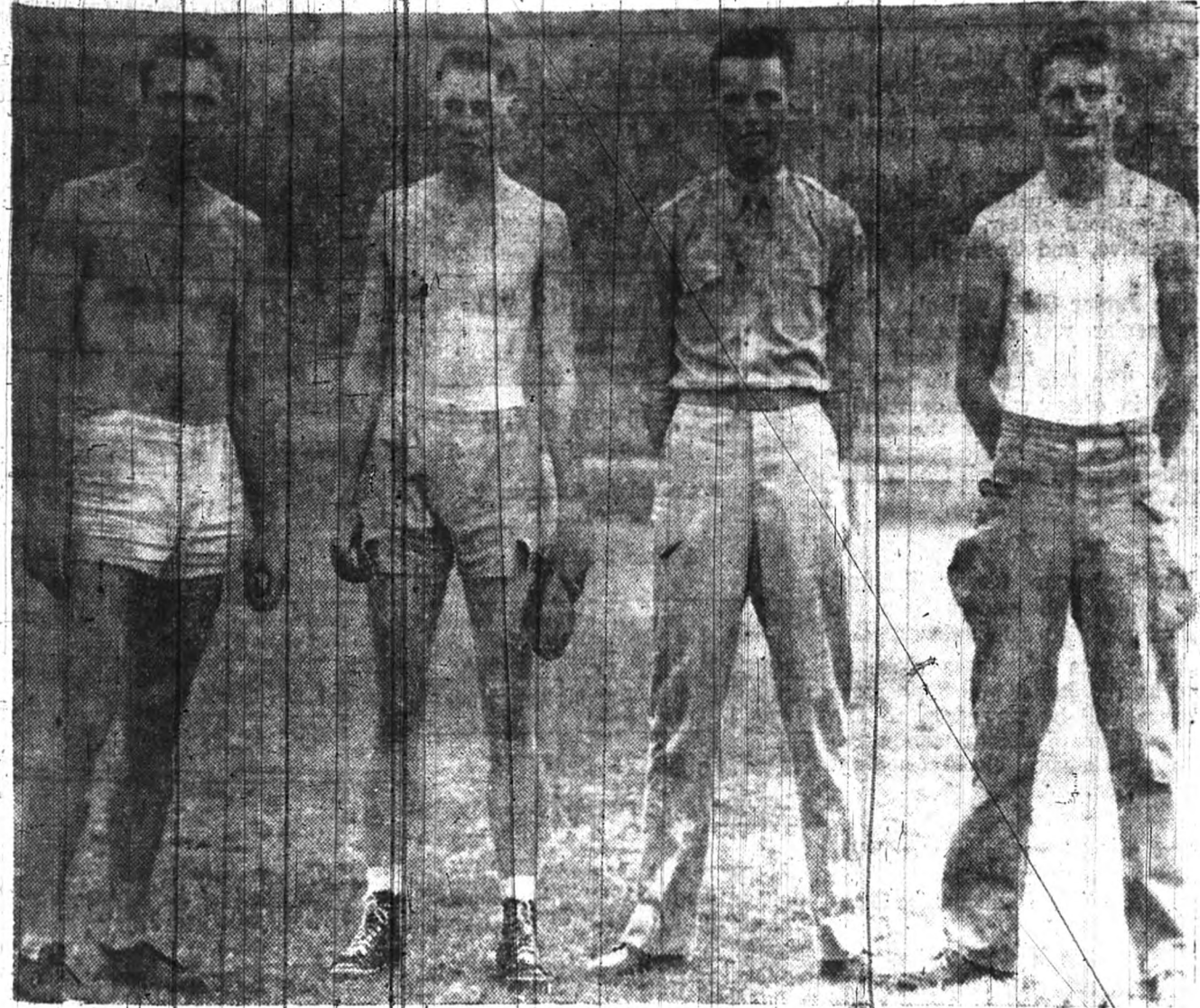
The University of Texas had a long lead today toward the Southwest Conference Tennis championship.

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Those owners whose horses ducked Citation and Coaltown in the Kentucky Derby to stake the Preakness and Belmont stakes have found little room for comfort the last few days.

This seems to be the general attitude: "If my request was the stand-out derby threat of the east and couldn't get close to Citation and Coaltown, how are our stay-at-homes going to fare against the Calumet one-two punch?"

The Preakness is two Saturdays away and the Belmont is slated June 12. That gives owners of rival three-year-olds plenty of time to decide.

Ben Whitakers my request, the Wood Memorial hero who was unbeaten this year until he ran up against the Calumet Twins at Louisville, is expected to try again.

C. V. Whitney's Mount Marcy, a comparatively new development, is another likely challenger. Trainer S. L. Veitch has been pointing Mount Marcy, second in the wood and an impressive victor at Jamaica Saturday, for the Baltimore special.

As for the Better Sells, Gasparillas, Salmagundis, River Lanes, Big Dials, etc., the prospect of facing Citation and Coaltown is a rather frightening thing.

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
