A. D. Martin Jr., a freshman mechanical engineering student of Dallas, was selected the outstanding cadet of the freshman regiment at the Mother's Day review held yesterday at Little Aggield.

In receiving this honor, Martin was presented a medal and certificate by Dean of the Annex J. P. Abbott.

Also receiving medals and certificates at the parade were representatives from each company of freshmen.

Most outstanding cadet of Company 1 was Charles H. Neely of Paris. Honor cadet of Company 2 was Robert L. Sturdivant of Dallas.

Raymond J. Kunze of Giddings was named the outstanding member of Company 3; George V. Chaffton of Dallas, Company 4; Clyde D. Henderson Jr. of Honey Grove, Company 5; LeVon Massengale Jr. of Dallas, Company 6; Wilman D. Barnes of Abilene, Company 7; Gordon C. Edgar of Eagle Pass, Company 8; and James E. Pianta of San Antonio, Company 9.

Company 6, commanded by John E. Gossett of Houston, was chosen the honor organization at Little Aggield. A ribbon was presented the unit and it will be placed on the company's guidon.

Units and individuals were judged by a committee of military officers at the Annex.

In the selection of the outstanding cadets, emphasis was placed on academic proficiency. The breakdown of selection is: 50 percent, academic proficiency; 15 percent, military proficiency; 10 percent, character, personality, and attitude; and 10 percent, extracurricular.

In judging the units, 50 percent was based on military proficiency; 20 percent on academic rating; 20 percent on discipline; and 10 percent on intramurals.

Following the flower-planting ceremony at Little Aggield, the freshman regiment paraded for visitors. At that time the awards were made to the outstanding companies and cadets.

The barracks were open for inspection by visiting parents from 9 to 12.

After the review, Rev. Carlos Davis, director of the Wesleyan Foundation of the A&M Methodist Church, was principal speaker at the special Mother's Day service in the chapel.

During the afternoon a band concert behind the chapel, an exhibition performance of the freshman drill team, and a reception at the Student Center were held.

The day's activities concluded with a retreat formation of the freshman regiment.
