of Arkansas for first place at 12 feet. Both schools received 5 1/2 points as Texas' Robert Walters failed to place. Walters almost tared this event into a five way tie when he went over the bar at 12 feet, but nudged it slightly with his hand on the way down and the wind helped it drop. Score: A&M 3 1/2, Texas 31, Arkansas 20 1/2, Rice 12, SMU 1.

The Sprint relay ended as expected with the Longhorns nipping the Aggies by three yards with a time of 43 seconds flat. Arkansas finished third although Scott did run on the Razorback quartet as was expected. Kape nosed out Baylor for fourth place. The score: A&M 87 1/2, Texas 36, Arkansas 22 1/2, Rice 13, SMU 1.

JOHN ROBERTSON of Texas edged out Webb Jay of A&M for first place in the broad jump. Jay's preliminary mark of 23 feet 8 inches looked good until Robertson hit 23 feet 9 7/8 inches. But the Aggies came out ahead when J. K. Hill and L. O. Coleman took second and third with 23 feet 6 1/4 inches and 22 feet 5 1/4 inches. This was one of the sprints which broke the Steer's back as A&M went further ahead. Score: A&M 48 1/2, Texas 41, Arkansas 22 1/2, Rice 13, SMU 1.

With only twenty minutes rest after running the half mile Thompson came back to cop the two mile run in 9:47.6.

Aggie Jerry Bonnen, who ran the best race of his career, came in second. Hampton, who had previously taken third in the mile, took another turn by coming in behind Bonnen. Milton Nipper of Texas was fourth.

After the two mile run the score stood: A&M 48 1/2, Texas 47, Arkansas 22 1/2, Rice 13, SMU 1.

GEORGE KADERA twice sailed the discus over the conference of 163 feet record but one was a practice throw and the other one was scratched when he stepped over the circle.

Kadera took his first place on a throw of 153 feet 11 1/2 inches. Edridge Adam of SMU was second with 143 feet 2 1/2 inches, and Texas' Clay Aames beat out Charles Baker of Arkansas by one-fourth of an inch for third place. A&M picked up three points on the discus to go further ahead. Score: A&M 60 1/2, Texas 49, Arkansas 23 1/2, Rice 13, SMU 4.

Scott took his third first place of the day when he nosed out Aggie Robert Hill in the 220 yard low hurdles. Scott's time of 23 seconds tied the conference record held by Wilcox of Rice.

Bill Garton of A&M took third and return of Rice was fourth. This left the standings as follows: A&M 68 1/2, Texas 49, Arkansas 28 1/2, Rice 14, SMU 4.

The Aggies cinched the crown when the results of the javelin came in. Frank Guss of Texas made the best throw, 211 feet 6 1/4 inches, recorded in the nation this year to take an easy first place. Tommie Rice was second with 189 feet 6 1/4 inches followed by Scott with 188 feet 3 inches. Robert Good of A&M took fourth with 181 feet 3 1/2 inches. The score then stood: A&M 59 1/2, Texas 51, Arkansas 30 1/2, Rice 17, SMU 4.

The final event of the day, the mile relay, came off as expected with A&M coming home first by a good margin. Texas was second, Rice was third and Arkansas took fourth.

A&M's time of 3:17.0 was three tenths of a second off the conference record. The final score was A&M 64 1/2, Texas 57, Arkansas 31 1/2, Rice 19, SMU 1. TCU and Baylor failed to score a point.

## Participation In Bowl Games Discouraged By SWC Officials

HOUSTON, May 17.—(AP)—Friday the Southwest Conference adopted penalties to be enforced for violations of its "purity code" and set up a committee to study possible expansion of the conference.

The purity code violations, to deal primarily with problems arising from recruiting of athletes and the awarding of athletic scholarships, range from probation of conference schools to outright expulsion.

Individual athletes could be suspended one year with loss of a season eligibility or could receive permanent loss of eligibility.

The conference expansion committee, instructed to make its report in December, resulted from a delegation of Lubbock citizens appearing before the conference faculty committee to ask that Texas Technological College be admitted to the conference.

Heading the Lubbock committee was Bill McMillan, building contractor. No officials of Texas Tech appeared before the conference group.

Indirectly, the faculty group placed a limitation on conference teams participating in post-season football bowl games.

The group adopted a regulation whereby any school receiving conference approval to participate in such contests will be required to pay the conference 25 percent of all net receipts or \$19,000, whichever is the greater.

## Sons of Aggie Coaches Star In Swim Meet

Lamar High of Houston edged out Highland Park 32 to 31, for the State High School Swimming Championship at A&M Saturday, but two future Aggies took high point honors.

Van Adamson, son of the Aggie Swimming Coach, earned all of Consolidated's twelve points to lead the scoring. Adamson won the 50-yard free style in 25.7 seconds, and the 100-yard backstroke in 1:06.9.

Billy Karow of Austin High School of Bryan won the 100-yard free style in 58.9 and placed second in the 100-yard breaststroke. Karow is the son of the Aggie basketball and baseball coach, Marty Karow. Karow was second high point man with 10 points.

Johnny Crawford and Wynant Wilson, both of Woodrow Wilson of Dallas, gained 9-1-3 points each. The first five teams were, in order, Lamar, Highland Park, Woodrow Wilson with 28 points, Austin High of Austin with 22 points, and Austin High of Houston with 13 points.

Crawford set a new record in the breaststroke by going the distance in 1:06.5 and then teamed with Burnett and Wilson to set a record of 1:45.6 in the 180-yard Medley Relay.

## Aggies Swamped on Friday And Squeezed Out Saturday

The luck of the Irish certainly wasn't with the Aggies at Clark Friday and Saturday afternoons as the Texas Longhorns galloped into an undisputed SWC lead in Friday's game and squeezed past the Aggies Saturday.

The Steers greeted the Aggies with a barrage of base hits Friday to score a 10 to 4 victory. Neither the efforts of Earl Beesley, Alvis Nixon, or Bruce Morrisse stopped them.

In five innings of play Beesley gave up eight runs off of eight hits. Ed Knieper, Texas right fielder, broke into the line-up in a big way by slapping a home run against Beesley. He hit safely three more times, two singles and a double.

Starting the sixth inning, Alvis Nixon relieved Beesley on the mound but failed to curb the Longhorns as he walked two, gave up four runs and four hits.

Bruce Morrisse entered the game and finished up for A&M. Morrisse settled down to steady ball as he fanned five Texans to face him. Off of four hits, he allowed four runs. Two of these he walked in.

For a while it looked as if Bobby Layne had a shot at his big hit. But in the eighth inning, Jim Calvert, who enjoyed a great day at bat, led off with a double.

Morrisse got on by an error by Joe Randerson, Longhorn second baseman. Russell Mays' infield blow scored Calvert on Randerson's second error.

In the ninth inning, the Aggies picked up another three runs. Hollmig walked, Fretz and Thornton doubled to bring in two runs and Calvert's single scored the last run.

The Texas double play combination of Zomlefer, Randerson and Hamilton raked up three double plays and took the sting out of the Aggies attack.
