First Issue of Veterinarian Will Hit Mails in Few Days

The first issue of the Southwestern Veterinarian, published by the A&M Student Chapter of the AVMA will be in the mail to subscribers within a few days.

Unlike many publications which start off weakly and endure a long struggle before making good, the SW Veterinarian's Volume 1 Number 1 edition is a full-fledged, well-edited publication of 48 pages.

An attractive cover shows a little girl carrying her pet dog to the vet. Inside, the magazine is filled with technical articles in which graduate and student veterinarians pass along their experiments and experiences in healing animals.

The introductory editorial states: "We hope that this publication will serve as a communique from one veterinarian to another. We feel that there is a dire need for a source of information about the type of veterinary medicine that is practiced in the Southwest."

Among special features of the first issue are the program of the Veterinary Conference to be held here June 17-18; a "Profile" of Dr. R. C. Dunn, dean of the Vet Med School, and a photographic center spread, "Shots at Random," showing activities at the college clinic.

A number of appropriate cartoons lighten the serious tone of the publication, and are printed in the Alumni notes section.

The first issue is edited by Louis E. Buck, Karl Wallace is associate editor; assistant editors include Max Lowe, Al Price, and James Hoban.

Larry Gore is advertising manager, with Hugh Wallace as assistant. Bob Shell is business manager, assisted by M. R. Calliham.

Last 'Commentator' to Present Large Array of Short Stories

Until several days ago, the most important question to the desperately working members of the Commentator staff was, "Will the Commentator come out before the end of the semester?"

Now that it is safe to predict that the Commentator will be printed in time, the question is, "Will anybody be here to read it?"
