

# Student Life Group Ratifies Student Senate Constitution

Final ratification of the Student Senate Constitution was made at the last meeting of the Student Life Committee held on May 27. The entire constitution was discussed and certain minor changes were made with the approval of a representative of the Student Senate. The first three articles of the constitution for the student body remained unchanged after ratification by the Student Life Committee.

In the fourth article, section II, provision four was changed to read that the vice-presidents of the classes who are not on the Student Life Committee shall be members of the Student Senate. In provision five of the same article and section the number of student senators elected at large was changed to 43 instead of 42.

In provision one, section III of the same article the secretary assumed another duty of setting up permanent files in the Student Activities Office. Under

provision three a change was made concerning election committees.

The election committee shall consist of five (5) members elected by the Student Senate from its membership and one staff member appointed by the Dean of Men. Formerly the constitution required only five members elected by the Student Senate from its membership. Several phrases were reworded to clarify the statements but no other changes in provisions were made.

In section IV of article four a change was made in which the Student Senate shall reserve the right to accept or reject a petition for the removal of a student senator. Any student senator failing to attend three regular meetings of the student senate during the two regular semesters without justified excuse shall be automatically disqualified from membership to the Student Senate for the remainder of the year. Formerly this pro-

vision read that the student senator should be disqualified for the remainder of the term.

In article four, section VII, provision two, recreation was added to the list of functions which the Student Senate shall have the power to investigate. Section XI was revised but no changes in provisions were made.

An amendment to the constitution shall require a favorable vote of at least three fourths of the members of the body concerned. At least two-thirds of the members of the various student organizations must vote in favor of the constitution before it can be ratified.

The constitution will now go to the Academic Council for its ratification. The constitution will then go into effect.

## Dormitory Raid Uncovers Mess Hall Equipment

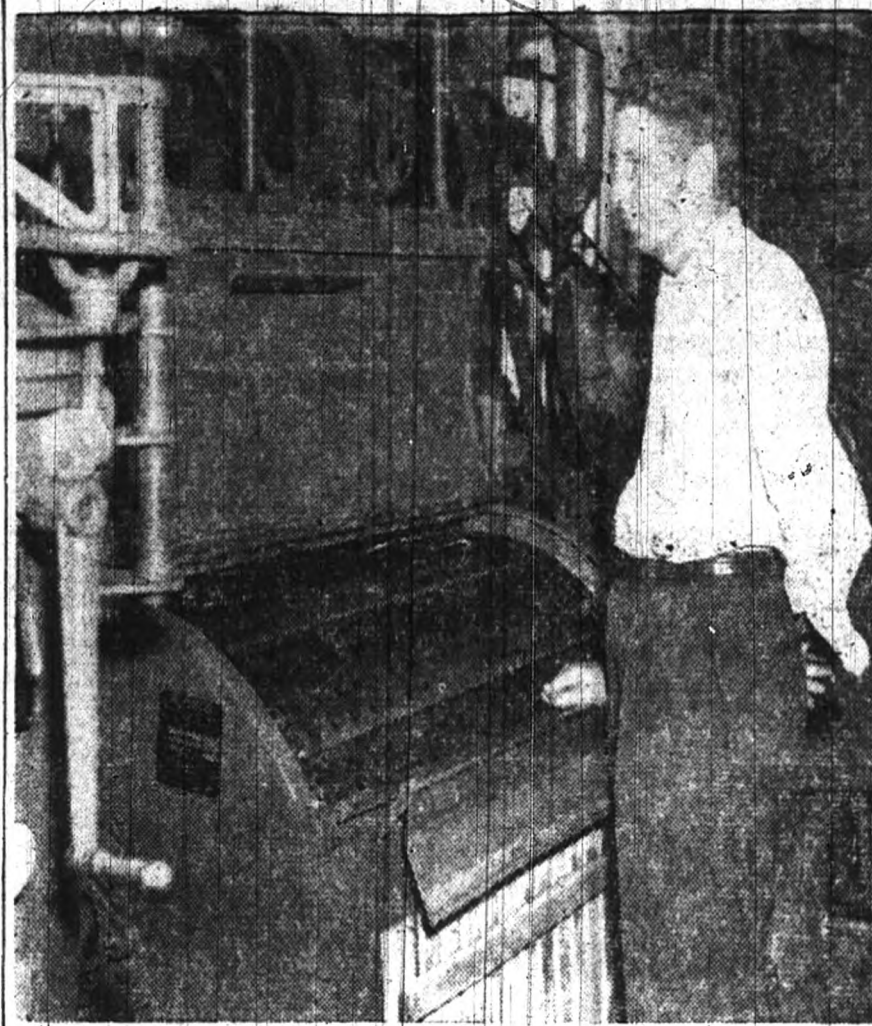

A total of 237 knives, forks and spoons were confiscated, along with 31 cups and saucers, 19 salt shakers, 10 sugar containers and 10 pepper shakers, 2 toasters and 1 electric percolator.

The mess hall equipment will be returned to the rightful owners, as will the cooking equipment after punishment has been meted out to the erring chefs, Murray said.

Afternoon speakers and their subjects are: B. T. Simms, USDA, Washington, D. C., "Foot and Mouth Disease;" W. A. Boney, Jr., Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, "Newcastle Disease;" and E. R. Schroeder, Angell Memorial Animal Hospital, Boston, Massachusetts, "Small Animal Orthopedics."

A banquet has been planned for Thursday evening.

Friday morning, June 18, A. H. Groth, of the Regional Research Laboratory, Auburn, Alabama, will speak on "Gastro-Intestinal Parasites of Cattle." Johnson and Schroeder, previous day speakers, will again address the group.

Friday afternoon, V. B. Robinson of College Station will use as his subject "Laboratory Diagnosis," after which visiting lecturers will hold a panel discussion led by Simms.

## Illinois Graduate Joins Geography Department Staff

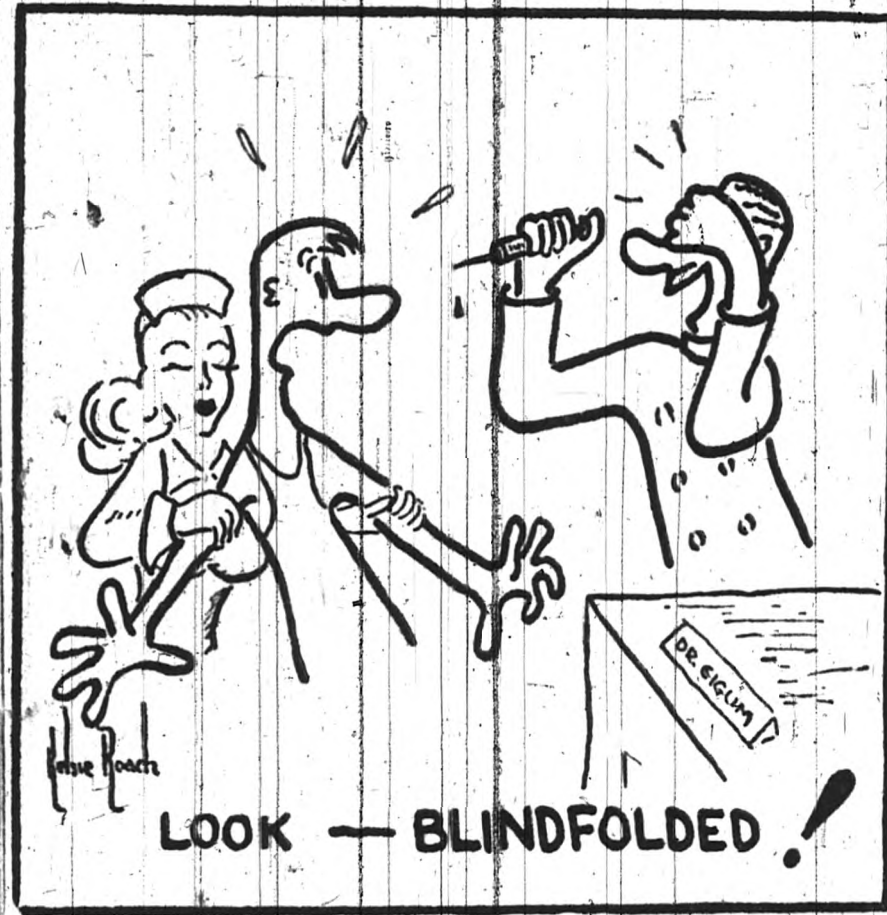
Robert S. Kiester, navy veteran and graduate of the University of Illinois, has joined the A&M geography department.

## Next U. S. President Could Be History's Youngest or Oldest

WASHINGTON, (AP)—The next president may be the youngest or the oldest, in United States history.

If 41-year-old HAROLD E. STASSEN of Minnesota wins the Republican nomination and the election, he will be the youngest of our chief executives.

If 68-year-old GENERAL DOUGLAS MACARTHUR is the Republican nominee and is elected, he will be the oldest man to take over the presidency.

Youngest president was Theodore Roosevelt, who at 42 stepped up from the vice presidency after the assassination of McKinley in 1901.

Oldest president was William Henry Harrison, inaugurated 23 days after his 68th birthday. If General MacArthur becomes the next president, his inauguration will take place six days before his 69th birthday.

President Harrison, old warrior of Tippecanoe fame, rode his white horse from the White House to the capitol on a wintry inauguration day. He contracted pneumonia after standing in a raw wind for an hour while delivering his inaugural address. He died exactly one month after his inauguration.

Next two oldest presidents were James Buchanan and Zachary Taylor, 65 and 64, at their inaugurations.

Harry Truman was 60 when he succeeded President Roosevelt and if he is elected next fall will be 64 at his second inauguration.

Second youngest president was Ulysses S. Grant, who was 46 when he took office. Youngest president at noon was William Jennings Bryan. He was 36 when he was first chosen Democratic standard bearer in 1896.
