

Ambassador Kyle To Resign September 1

Edwin J. Kyle, ex-Aggie and former Dean of Agriculture, has resigned his post as Ambassador to Guatemala, effective September 1. The White House announced Tuesday that President Truman had accepted the resignation.

"Dean" Kyle accepted the position in 1945 for a period of two years. He stated in his resignation that since he has now served for more than three years, he would like to leave the diplomatic service.

When Dean Kyle accepted the post of ambassador to Guatemala, he left a record at A&M that would be hard to equal. He entered A&M in 1896 and graduated with the class of '99. Among the many honors and achievements that were his during this time were the presidency of the YMCA, the position of the Senior Class, the title of highest ranking cadet officer and valedictorian of his class.

It is an interesting fact that he is the only person in A&M's history to have served as Commandant of the school while a student. He served in this capacity for over a month.

After receiving his Bachelor and Master of Science degrees at Cornell, Dean Kyle returned to A&M in 1902 as a horticulture instructor. He was made head of that department in 1905, and in 1911, he was appointed Dean of the School of Agriculture.

Besides his duties as an educator, he was president of the Athletic Association from 1913 till 1917 at which time that body was recognized as the most efficient and best organized in the Southwest. In 1937, he was drafted as chairman of the Athletic Council and served there until 1944 when he accepted the post in Guatemala.

When the resignation becomes effective in the fall, Dean and Mrs. Kyle plan to return to College Station to reside.

Whether the first age group selected would be exhausted before another is called up has not been decided. Mostly it depends upon the size of the calls by the armed services which in turn depends upon the number of voluntary enlistments.

Military authorities estimate that about two out of every three men in the 19-through-25 age bracket who are single and non-veterans will have to serve in the army, navy, Air Forces or Marines, either as draftees or volunteers. There are roughly 1,552,000 single, non-veterans in that age group.

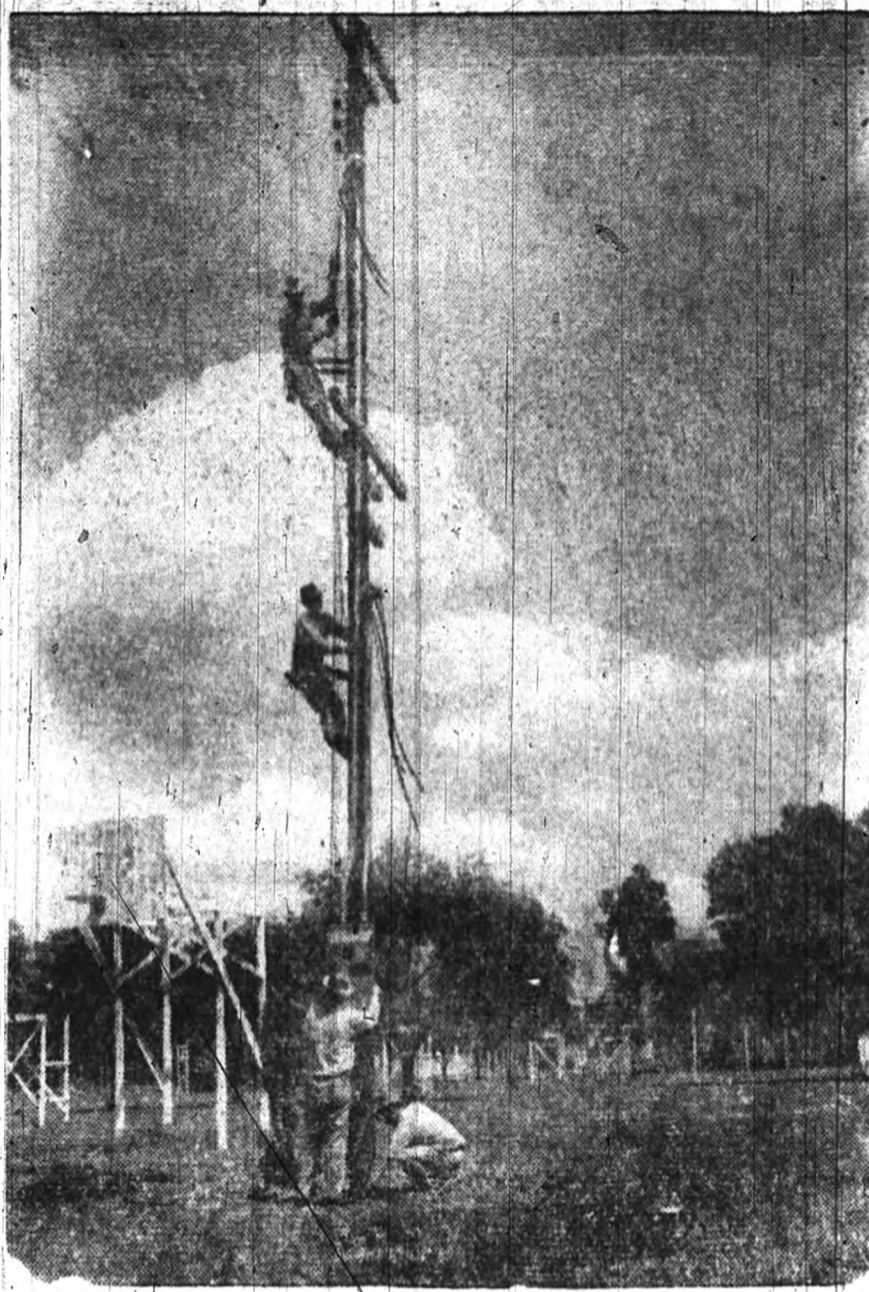
Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, director of the office of selective service records and director of the wartime draft, presumably would be the head man again.
