### Aggies On Cotton Tour Taste Real Southern Hospitality

Winners of the cotton tour are now on a trip which will carry them to the most important cotton centers in the nation.

The group composed of Dr. Luther G. Jones; Wallace L. Hackler; L. E. Crane; Arnold Nowotny; and Virgil C. Caraway, left College Station June 5. Their destination for the first day was Monroe, Louisiana.

A brief stop was made at the Indian Mound Forest Nursery near Alto, Texas. W. L. Marshall, superintendent of the nursery, showed the Aggies around.

The winners of the tour spent June 6 on the Bell plantation near Greenville, Mississippi. Andrew Bell, an Aggie, and Percy Bell, an ex-Aggie, were the hosts. The plantation has never lost its old southern atmosphere. The Bell home is quite modern and is surrounded by towering oaks and cottonwood trees. Colored servants, who make the plantation all the more reminiscent of the "Old South," are plentiful.

After dinner Andrew and Percy Bell conducted the members of the cotton tour over the plantation. Cotton is produced at the rate of one to two bales per acre. Pastures of bermuda grass and various clovers furnish nutritious grazing for the shorthorn cattle. Soybeans grown at the rate of 40 to 60 bushels per acre are rapidly gaining a place in the farming system. Negro tenants spread over the plantation furnish the necessary labor.

From the Bell plantation the cotton tour members traveled to Stoneville, Mississippi where two days were spent looking over the Delta Agricultural Experiment Station.

### Ag Commissioners Of Texas, Georgia Indicted by Clark

WASHINGTON, June 16 (AP)—A Federal grand jury today indicted the agricultural commissioners of Texas and Georgia, two farm organizations and two other persons on charges of violating the lobbying law.

Attorney General Clark, who announced the grand jury action, said they are accused of conspiracy to lobby for higher commodity prices without registering with Congress. He said they had a personal interest in higher prices because of trading on commodity markets.
