21 Other Texas Trackmen Entering Milwaukee Meet

Heading for Milwaukee and the National AAU track and field championships there Friday and Saturday will be three Aggie track stars, Art Harnden, Ray Holbrook, and George Kadera.

Harnden, who reigns as king of the quarter-milers in the Southwest has placed at the National for the past two years. At Minneapolis Harnden placed second in the 400 meters, losing to Norman Ruckes of the University of South Carolina.

He has shown much improvement in the past year and expects to place high in the Milwaukee trials.

Holbrook, who ran in a fast heat at the Minneapolis trials and failed to qualify, is back in the heats after placing second in the 400 meters in the South Texas AAU track and field meet at San Antonio last Friday.

Holbrook still has another year of eligibility at A&M and will be counted on heavily in next year's Aggie cinder squad.

Kadera, who is only a sophomore, is the outstanding weight man of the Aggie squad and of the Southwest Conference. He placed third in the discus behind Fortune Gordien of the University of Minnesota and Victor Frank of Yale in the NCAA meet at Minneapolis.

The Milwaukee group will be composed of 24 Texas trackmen who will compete under the colors of the San Antonio Athletic Club. Coach of the delegation will be Texas A&M's Colonel Frank Anderson who this past spring guided A&M to its second straight Southwest Conference track championship. Manager of the squad will be Erich Pohl, local A.A.U. registration chairman.

The athletes started leaving Tuesday with a nine-man group leaving San Antonio at 3:30 p.m. Leaving from San Antonio were weightman Jack Crawley of Southwest Texas State, sprinters Perry Samuels of the University of Texas and Truman Arnold of the University of Houston, hurdlers Ken Boren of Texas University and Lloyd Parker of Trinity University, distant runners Charles Best of Fort Sam Houston and S. H. Escoto of Alice High School, and pole vaulters Malcolm Marks of Fort Sam Houston and Billy Baeffield of the University of Houston.

Frank Guess, University of Texas javelin tosser, joined the group at Austin.

Light Reports Hollmig Has Pro Contract

Stan Hollmig, Aggie baseball and football star, has reportedly signed a pro-baseball contract with the Philadelphia Phillies according to a late report from the Associated Press.

According to a report from the Associated Press released by the San Antonio Light, Hollmig received \$25,000 for signing with the Phillies and has been ordered to their Wilmington, Delaware, Farm Club in the Class B Interstate League.

However, this is not a confirmed report. A&M officials and Associated Press representatives have been unable to contact Hollmig, and his whereabouts at present are unknown.

Hollmig has two years of eligibility left at A&M in both football and baseball.

His loss will be felt keenly by both the football and baseball squads if the reports are correct.

Last fall Stan was the leading punter on the football team and the number 1 passer.

In baseball he was selected on the all-conference baseball team for the second successive year and was one of the most feared batters in the conference. He led the SWC in number of home runs hit during the season's play.
