

# Texas League and Majors Select All-Star Players

## Ted Williams Is Individual Leader; DiMaggio Is Second

Balloting for the All-Star Baseball game in St. Louis next Tuesday ended Monday at midnight. Players from six National and five American League teams were chosen for starting assignments.

A record of 4,107,893 fans returned their selections during the three weeks of balloting. Ted Williams of the Boston Red Sox to be the individual leader with 1,556,784 votes. He was followed closely by Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals with 1,532,502, and Joe DiMaggio of the New York Yankees with 1,519,182 votes.

The line-ups chosen were for every position except pitcher. The National League chose only six pitchers instead of the customary eight. This enabled the selectors to select four third basemen instead of the usual pair. The extra-hot corner men are Sid Gordon of the New York Giants and Bob Elliott of the Boston Braves, both heavy

hitters that add power to the National's batting lineup. Here's how the starting line-up will shape up in St. Louis next Tuesday:

Southwestern sports writers have named an aggregation combining stellar pitching with batting power to face the Ft. Worth Gats in the eighth annual Texas League All-Star game to be played in Ft. Worth Tuesday night. As pilot of the group of all-stars the writers chose Al Vincent of the Tulsa Oilers.

The 19 player roster includes five men from both Houston and Tulsa, three from Shreveport, four from San Antonio, and one each from Dallas and Oklahoma City. Four players were unanimous choices. These were pitcher Perkowski, first baseman Kress, and outfielder Tatum of Tulsa, and third baseman DiBlasi of Houston.

Topping the list of pitchers are Perkowski, Tulsa, and Floyd Boyer and Pete Mazar of Houston. Prilewski leads the league in games won and innings pitched. Boyer is the leader in strike-outs and completed games, tied for

second in games won, and runner-up in innings pitched while Mazar is the first-half season leader in earned run averages.

## Harnden & Kadera Compete In Final Olympic Tryouts

Finals in the U. S. Olympic tryouts will be held in Chicago Friday and Saturday to determine the three clads who will represent the United States in the Olympic games at London next month.

Two Aggie contenders, George Kadera and Art Harnden, will be competing in these tryouts. Both Kadera and Harnden just completed an undefeated season in Southwest Conference track. Kadera placed third in the discuss throw in N.C.A.A. competition, being beaten by Fortier Gordon of Minnesota and Victor Frank of Yale. Harnden ran a fast second in the 400 meter dash, losing a close race to Norman Ruks of the University of South Carolina.

Other men in the Southwest Conference who placed in the N.C.A.A. meet, and will compete in Chicago are: Charlie Parker of Texas University who took second in the 200 meter dash, and third in the 100 meter dash; Jerry Thompson of Texas University who placed first in the 5,000 meter run; Clyde Scott of Arkansas who set a new record in the 110 meter high hurdles, Vern McGrew of Rice who tied for third in the high jump, and John Robertson and Frank Guess, both of Texas University who qualified in the broad jump and javelin.

## Few Bryan-College Residents Buying Season Tickets

Surprisingly few residents of the Bryan-College Station area so far have taken advantage of the special season-ticket offer being made by the athletic department, C. D. Ownby, business manager of athletics, stated today.

The Aggies will play only three football games on Kyle Field this fall and for the total price of the three football tickets, residents of this area can obtain season tickets to all sports events sponsored by the college during the entire 1948-49 school year.

The price of a season ticket is \$10.80.

Ownby also pointed out that season-ticket holders are in the priority category and will have chances to purchase tickets to the Texas A&M-Texas University game in Austin on November 25.

To receive ticket priorities, residents of the Bryan-College Station area must apply for tickets not later than July 24.

## Track Star Stella Walsh Retiring

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 9 (AP)—Stella Walsh, track veteran of more than a score of years talked retirement after out-shining the cream of the nation's women's athletes in Tuesday's National Women's AAU track meet.

"I'll probably retire from track this summer or fall," said the star of the Polish Woman's AC Cleveland, after a rousing triple-victory performance that was good for first in the broad jump, the 100-meter and the 200-meter runs.

Miss Walsh, who is ineligible for Olympic competition because she competed for her native Poland in the 1936 games, said she would turn her attention to golf.

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## Will Replace Hollmig . . .

### Farmer Football Team Boasts Able Punter In Bobby Dew

When Stan Hollmig signed a professional baseball contract recently, the Aggies lost the Southwest Conference's outstanding punter for the past two years.

There is no doubt about it that Hollmig's absence will be missed.

However, Coach Harry Stiteler was not left without an able punter.

The new Aggie head coach foresaw the possibility of losing Hollmig, really a great major league baseball prospect, and groomed another man to take his place.

That man is Bobby Dew, a letterman halfback from Corsicana.

Dew, whose services were limited last year because of an injured knee, still has two years of eligibility remaining. He's a cool, 24-year-old war veteran who can kick that football a far piece, and consistently, too.

Stiteler, when backfield coach of the Aggies last fall, worked

with Dew about an hour every afternoon. However, the 175 pound halfback had trouble getting away from his old faults and cashing in on the new pointers.

Then, during spring training, Dew suddenly began to kick just as Stiteler had hoped he would. His punts, high ones, too, began to average very close to 50 yards and went where Dew wanted them to go.

Dew will receive further attention from Stiteler when fall practice begins on September 1, and when the Aggies open the season against Villanova in Philadelphia on September 18, Dew is expected to be A&M's No. 1 punter.

To top Hollmig's marks, Dew will have to better the 40-yard average for all of last season and the 43.3 average Hollmig posted for the six Southwest Conference games in 1946.
