

EFFECTIVE HAY FEVER TREATMENT DISCOVERED

CHICAGO, Aug. 23 — (P)— A new drug has been more than 90 percent effective in treating 142 cases of hay fever and other al-lergic conditions, an Illinois phy-sician reported Saturday. The best showing was obtained against hay fever, with "good re-sults" reported in 66 of the 66 hay fever patients treated. The drug is thephorin, one of the anthishistamme group.
