

Ag Varsity Looks Better in Scrimmage

Injuries Still Numerous On Squad; Scrimmage Due Today

Coach Harry Stiteler was well pleased with the varsity's workout yesterday. He said that he had not expected to live out Saturday night, but he was in good spirits by practice time yesterday. There was no air of gloom which might be expected after Saturday's game.

The Aggie coaching staff held a long conference before practice yesterday while Coach Charlie DeWane reported on the Oklahoma Santa Clara game Saturday. Assistant coach Bob Gary, who helped DeWane scout, was also in the conference.

The varsity did look good yesterday. Back Ralph Daniel was showing power in the line, and Bart Isatou was making good end runs against a mixed varsity team defense.

"Peewee" Smith did fine on several quick opening plays, except when he fumbled once. The blocking was also greatly improved from last Saturday night.

Assistant Taylor probably saw his last scrimmage yesterday. The blood fallback from Honda (named from what appeared to be a mild brain concussion while blocking yesterday).

Taylor had suffered two head injuries in practice earlier this fall, and reported for heavy duty only last week. He was reported to have originally injured his head while playing high school football.

Another scrimmage is expected to be held by the varsity today. Yesterday's was light, with the players practicing on timing and blocking.

Tickle "Tuck" Chapin was still limping on an ankle which he injured Saturday. Trainer Blaine Kideout has been working on it at every opportunity and expects Chapin to be ready to go in a few days.

Quarterback Buryl Baty's ankle is still swollen and blind, but Kideout said that it is in better condition than it was this time last week. Otherwise the team seems to be in good physical shape.

Sports Writer Takes Dim View Of Night Games

DALLAS, Sept. 28 (AP) — If playing 11 games on the Southwest Conference football schedule at night this year is to get larger crowds, your correspondent takes a dim view of the situation.

We want a trifle sour Saturday night when only 11,000 turned out for the Tulsa-Baylor game in Waco. If a day game wouldn't draw that many, they ought to start giving away dishes.

If it's to beat the heat, there might be some justification, except that there's no need for it. Why play football in September anyway? Why not build larger stadia so that all those who want to see the important games can get tickets? Start the season about Oct. 1 when it's cool enough and when the games mean something and put enough seats in the stadium so that everybody who wants to see can get in.

The colleges and high schools can't blame baseball for attracting the crowds in September so that they have to hold their game at night in order to beat the heat and get enough fans out to pay for the tape and liniment.

Football is to blame for the overlapping seasons that fiddle the professional baseball leagues competing with the grid game. Baseball always has been a summer sport and always has run through September.

Football started encroaching several years ago. Time was when the grid sport started in October. Now, you'll find high schools in Texas playing the first week in September. The colleges are about a week later. If this night sports situation

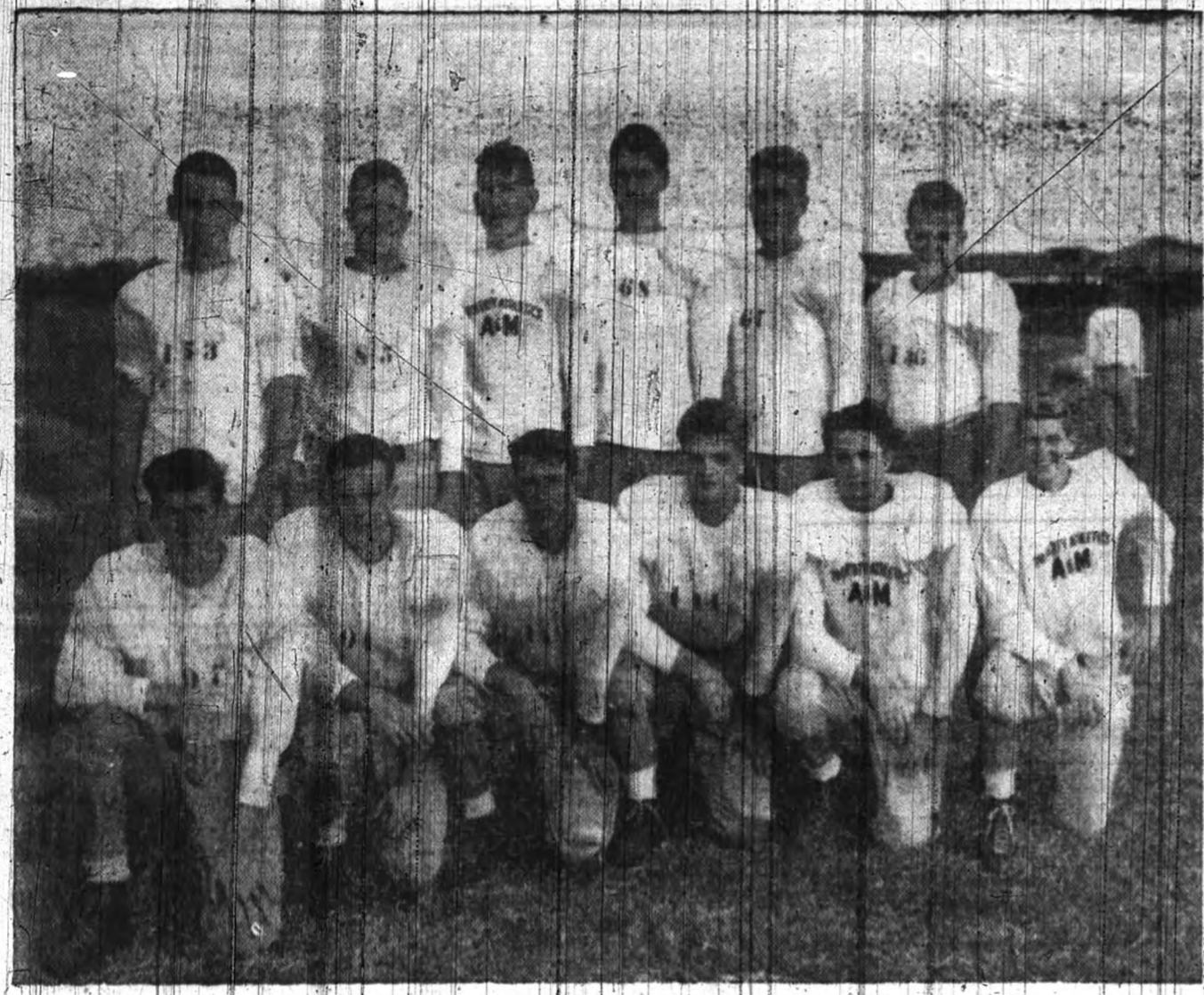
