The other starting tackle will probably bme Billy Pratt of Corpus Christi. Pratt weighs 190 pounds.



Coach Mark McMahon's Sooners Coach Mark McMahon's Sooners won the first game, 6-9, at Bryan, Texas, in 1903. Tackle Tom Tribbey scored the touchdown and End Dan Short, now a Cormer living west of Norman, booted the goal .That was the only time Oklahoma has ever led the series. Charley Mo-ran's Texas Aggies swept the 1907 1909 and 1912 games, then no more contests were played for 32 years, when the modern series began. Four games have been played on Texas soil and four in Okla-homa.




