

Fish Down Tarleton 12-6 in Night Contest

Glenn Lippman Breaks Tie in Fourth Quarter With 90-Yard Touchdown Run

Led by their versions of Mr. Inside and Mr. Outside the Texas Aggie freshman football team stormed over the John Tarleton Plowboys last night by a score of 12 to 6 in the fourth quarter at Stephenville. In this case the Mr. Outside

was Glenn Lippman of El Campo. This stocky youth scored both of the touchdowns made by the Fish. He seemed to get hotter as the game progressed. Bernard Lemmons was Mr. Inside personified. This 180 pounder from Ozona kept the JTAC team on its heels with his slashes over tackles and guards. The first TD was set up on a seven yard slant by Lemmons after the team had driven the ball to the 15 yard line. The John Tarleton band performed before the game, forming the letters A&M and JT. The band was in ROTC uniforms except for the drum majors, foresters and bell leaders. A&M kicked defending the south goal. There was no advantage in defense since the game was at night and there was no wind. Ralph Dresser of San Antonio booted the ball over the end zone to start the game. The first half of the game was fought on fairly even terms with the Fish occasionally showing surts of power and speed.

The half ended with the Fish recovering a JTAC fumble on the Plowboy 16 yard line.

During the third quarter the game belonged to the freshmen completely except when it came to putting a score across the double strips.

The Plowboys worked their way past their own twenty only in the last minutes of the quarter. All the scoring of the game took place during the last period. The first score was the result of a sixty-one yard drive by the Fish featuring Bernard Lemmons with help from Billy Tidwell, Aggie Saxe and Glenn Lippman.

Lemmons started the drive with a six yard smash through center to the Fish 35. Lippman then carried to the Fish 41 and developed a log cramp and left the game. The Fish suffered a five yard offside penalty at this stage but Lemmons then carried to the JTAC 43 for another first. Tidwell then dashed over center to the Tarleton 26. Saxe went to the 22 and Lemmon to the 16 for a first. The Fish again drew a five yard penalty for offside.

Lemmons made three and then went to the eight. Lippman reentered the game and scored from the eight yard line. Baldetrachs try for extra points was no good.

The Plowboys took Dresser's kick off on their own 15 and there was no return of the kick. A drive for a touchdown for the Stephenville boys was started after a pass interference was called against the

Fish on the JTAC 40 yard line. Payne then passed to JTAC end Ferguson who carried to the Aggie twenty. Two plays later Payne again hit Ferguson with a pass for a score. Scotts try for extra points was wide. The score was now tied at six all with a minute and a half to play.

The kickoff was taken by Lippman on the Fish ten yard line. The El Campo freshman cut to the right picked up some excellent blocking and was on his way to pay dirt. The try for extra points was no good. The game ended with the score 12-6. Freshmen in the line whose play stood out were Bob Davidson, Eto Nohaviza and Fred Fulgham at the guard positions, and Billy Pratt, Russell Hudeck and James Little at the tackle posts. The team still appeared to need polish in quite a few spots but this could be expected with the short time available for practice and the large squad out for freshman ball.

The Aggies will be the underdogs in this game and have been rated by many to lose by one or two touchdowns. However, after several hard work-outs this week the team is in good shape and is confident of bringing home their first victory this year.

Coach Stiteler has taken 37 players with him to Norman for the game.
