RESUME OF STEVENSON
JOHNSON BATTLE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4—(P)—
Coke R. Stevenson of the as carried to the hation's highest court Saturday his fight to keep Lyndon Johnson's hame off the November ballot as the Democratic nominee for the L. S. Schate.

Stevenson's atturneys asked the United States Subreme Court to reverse a ruling: by Associate Judge Hugo Black which permitted Johnson's name to go on the ballot. The tenth district congressman was certified by the Democratic State Convention as the winner over Stevenson in the Aug. 28 primary by 87 votes.

Black's statement, issued early this week, stayed a temporary injunction against sertifying Johnson's name for the ballot. The injunction was gratted in mid-September by Federal District Judge T. Whitfield Davidson at Fort Worth. At the same time, Judge Davidson ordered ar investigation of the Aug. 28 vote in three south Texas counties where Stevenson claimed irregularities dost him enough votes to deprive him of the nomination. The investigation, started by two commissioners appointed by Judge Davidson, was halted abruptly by Justice Black's order.

Stevenson's atterneys argued in

Stevenson's atterneys argued in their motion Saturday that a single Supreme Court justice is without jurisdiction and power to issue a stay order They said Black had "erroneously and improvidently" ruled in favor of Johnson.
