

'Behave This Year,' Cautions OU Prexy

The governor of Oklahoma is willing to bet that Oklahoma whips Texas Saturday, but Coach Blair Cherry hasn't yet told governor Beauford Jester "it's a cinch."

Cherry yesterday listed four key Longhorns as doubtful starters against Oklahoma.

One of three regulars who may sit out the game is Center Dick Harris, out for 16 days with an injured knee. Others on the casualty list are tackle Ed Kelley and fullback Tommy Landry. End Ben Brocker is still limping from a knee injury received in the North Carolina game two weeks ago.

Oklahoma's chief executive, Roy J. Turner, yesterday offered to let Governor Jester a fishing license on Lake Texoma that Oklahoma would beat Texas.

Texas was the only team reporting injuries of key men.

Texas A&M's chances against Louisiana State were enhanced when quarterback Bury Baly reported for practice. Baly has been out for two weeks with an injured ankle, but Coach Harry Stiteler thinks he'll be able to play this week.

Center Billy Ray Thomas and End Sam Butz may return to action for Arkansas and Tackle Jim Reichert, injured in the TCU game last week, probably will be able to perform his place-kicking duties.

Light workouts for regulars were the order of the day at Arkansas and Southern Methodist University yesterday, but both coaches, John Barnhill and Matty Bell,

LSU Head Mentor Ex-Pro Ball Star, and All-American End

EX All-American Gaynell Tinsley is back at the scene of his triumphs hoping to make LSU history repeat itself. Head coach Tinsley of the Tigers took over the reins of the LSU eleven this spring when veteran coach Bernie Moore accepted the position of commissioner of the Southeastern conference.

Tinsley became the first LSU alumnus to ever handle the job in modern times and from the looks of his teams he'll be handling the job for a good long time. He is facing the toughest schedule in the schools history playing such teams as North Carolina, Georgia and Tulane.

Tinsley, who is one of the youngest coaches in college history, got his start in '35 as a sophomore at LSU. He had accepted a basketball scholarship in that year but fate had other plans for the likable mentor. By the end of the season he was regarded as the finest end prospect ever to wear the Purple and gold.

The following season brought the real payoff. Although not a finished pass receiver Tinsley flashed such a rugged defensive performance that he was placed on nearly every important All American eleven in the county. He was the first LSU player to be rewarded in this manner.

In his next year he played such superlative ball that he again won All American honors and put the Tigers in the Sugar Bowl for the second straight year. After graduating in 1937 Tinsley set out to
