

DAVIDSON THINKS SENATE ISSUE IEAD ABILENE Oct. -----Feder-al Judge T. Whitfield Davidson said Wednesday, he doesn't "anti-cipate any further developments" in the court fight Lyndon Johnson and Former Gov. Coke Stevenson.

Coke Stevenson. Judge Davidson, after reading newspaper accounts of the Supreme Court proceeding yesterday, said he saw no need for further hearings on Stevenson's allegations of vote frauds in three south Texas coun-ties. He told the reporter-news that he had not heard from at-torneys for either Stevenson or Johnson this morning. The Supreme Court's decision re-moved obstacles to Johnson's name

moved obstacles to Johnson's name appearing on the ballots for the November 2 general election. It already has been cartified to coun-ty election boards by the secretary of state.

EIGHT MEN DIE

IN B-29 CRASH WAYCROSS, Ga., Oct. 7 - 4P-A B-29 bomber crashed Wednesday and eight of its occupants were killed.

Four of the plant's occupants, including Capt. We H. Moore, of Wilkinsburg. Pa., bailed out and landed safely.

Eyewitnesses said the huge craft exploded in the air as it passed over Waycross and fell in flames on the outskirts, near the edge of a swamp.

a swamp. Four bodies were found in the tail of the plane. Four others were scattered about the field along with bits and pieces of the plane.
