

Munden Reigns As A&M's Ugly Man

Polls 1,065 Votes to Defeat Boggus by 200; Reeves Third, Hall Fourth and Stephens Fifth

Charlie Munden today began his reign as A. & M.'s ugliest man following Thursday night's runoff election which saw him score a cut victory over a field of five. The San Antonian, drawing heavy strength from the new area, polled 1065 votes to win by a margin of 200. Frank Boggus was second with 902 and David "Riverboat" Reeves was third with an even 700. Rupert Hall was fourth with 546 while Jimmy Stephens finished fifth with 526.

Election processes for the editorship of the freshmen page were started last night by Tom R. Carter, co-editor of the Battalion. Before officially opening the race, Carter told the freshmen that the Battalion was their newspaper as well as the newspaper of the people on the main campus. He said that the paper represented them to the people of the state and of the United States.

After asking the "fish" to take a sincere interest in their page, Carter explained the election rules. The deadline for nominations will be Monday at 5:00 p.m. After all nominations have been filed, a board will screen them in order to eliminate unqualified persons. This screening process is necessary since work on the page must begin immediately and a previously-trained man is essential.

Election by the Corps at the annex will be held Thursday in a manner similar to the election of class officers. The man winning the race will be named editor while the runner-up will receive the position of managing editor.

In conducting his talk Carter told the freshmen that one page a week in the Battalion would be theirs. He said that this page would promote a better understanding of an idea of what was going on at the Annex and consequently would promote a better understanding between the men at the Annex and those on the campus.

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29 REA Meat Plant Managers Discuss Meat Curing Problems

Twenty-nine persons, representatives of the REA Cooperative Frozen Food Locker Association held a conference on the campus yesterday and today. Most of these persons are managers or workers in REA cooperative plants scattered throughout Texas. D. W. Williams, Vice Chancellor for Agriculture, welcomed the visitors to the campus with a speech in the Meat Lab Lecture Room.

Purpose of the meeting is to study the many problems of meat plant operation. The REA Cooperative has been organized for six months and this is their third meeting. Dr. J. C. Miller, head of the Animal Husbandry Department, addressed the group. His talk was an outline of the College's program in meat work.

Following the address by Dr. Miller, a hog carcass was cut up by Row W. Snyder, in charge of the meat lab operations. Next on the program was a discussion of the various cuts of pork for home use and curing. The group is interested in the curing and storage of pork rather than beef.

After lunch they watched a class of A. H. students slaughter several hogs. The process from live animals to halved carcasses was completed in about two hours. Dr. F. P. Jaggi, head of the Veterinary Hygiene Department,
