

Fish Team to Play Initial Intra-Squad Game Tomorrow

The freshman football team will hold its first full dress intrasquad game tomorrow at 2:30 on Kyle Field under the direction of assistant Freshman Coach Bob Gary. The game will pit the first and fourth elevens against the second and third.

Elsewhere on the page there is a complete roster of the first four teams. The Maroon team is the first and fourth team while the Whites are composed of second and third stringers.

The players have not been frozen to the eleven they are running with at the present time, but are free to move either up or down. Some of the boys listed as starters tomorrow might not be starting against the TCU politicos next week.

The coaches have been hindered by injuries on the Fish squad in recent weeks. Clarence "Hull" Lawson, Pat Diffie, and Jim Dobbins especially have been out of uniform in recent days.

Billy Tidwell of Houston has been one of the outstanding backs on the squad throughout the practice sessions and in the Tarleton game. Tidwell carries 155 pounds on a five foot seven inch frame, and is a speedy, hard little runner.

The largest man on the starting lineup for the Fish is Russell Hudeck of Houston. He is six feet, three inches tall and weighs 210 pounds. He moves well and seems to have a liking for the game of football.

One of the starting guards has been compared to Weldon Humble, former All-American guard at Rice because of the way he plays his guard position. He is Fred Fulgham of Pasadena, six feet and 185 pounds. Like Humble he slides with the play, moving with the ball carrier and intercepting him at or behind the line of scrimmage.

There will be no admission at the gate for the game tomorrow. All Aggies are invited by the coaches to come down and see the freshman team and form their own opinions as to what sort of material A&M is coming up for next year.

Since the LSU game in Baton

Rouge is at night, it will be possible to see one group of Aggies play a game and listen on the radio as they play another.

Since there will be no programs at the game, anyone planning to attend the game should take their roster on this page to the game in order to spot the players. There will be a public address system announcing the game.

A&M Consolidated Plays Riesel In District Opener

The A&M Consolidated Tigers play their first district game this season when they take on the Riesel Indians on Tiger Field tonight at eight o'clock.

The Indians have been defeated in their first two starts this year, losing to Crawford 28-0, and Bremond 13-6.

The Southwest Conference has been taking a beating in outside games lately, and it has been mighty rough on the forecasters. And this corner has been especially hard hit.

After two crop failures, the mortgage on this column is rapidly coming due.

Only five of thirteen predictions have been correct, which totals something like a .38 average. That is not so good. A man should be able to do that good even on the horses.

Something will have to burst soon in the Conference. The "mighty good" and the "dark horse" teams will be clashing, and somebody is going to get hurt. The first of these games is the Arkansas-Baylor clash at Fayetteville tomorrow, and the Hogs will have a tremendous home-town advantage.

Texas-Sooner Contest to Be Seen by 70,000

NORMAN, Okla., Oct. 8.—Buckled off eight times, Oklahoma will try again Saturday to ride the wildest steer of them all—Texas—in the big football rodeo south of the Red River.

It's the 43rd annual Texas-Oklahoma game. Televised, radio broadcast, photographed, written about and seen by almost 70,000 fans in the rebuilt Dallas Cotton Bowl, this 47-year old game, sold out since last summer, will be followed eagerly by some half million Southwesterners. Kickoff time is at 2:00 p. m.

Coach Blair Cherry's Texas Steers, defending Sugar Bowl champs, have had two weeks to lick their wounds since their upset defeat September 25 to an aroused North Carolina team that had pointed a whole year for them.

Frogs Will Fly To Indiana Tilt

FORT WORTH, Oct. 8.—TCU's Horned Frogs take to the air literally this week, as they leave today by chartered plane for Bloomington, Ind., and their Saturday game there with the Big Nine leaders, Indiana's undefeated Hoosiers.

A victory for the air-bourne Frogs over the high-flying Hoosiers is needed to restore TCU's hopes for 1948. At least that is what Purple squad members predicted themselves in a meeting following Saturday's 14 to 27 loss to Arkansas.

Billed in pre-season prognostications as the best TCU team since the Frog national champions of 1938, the Purple squad found its fans' hopes badly deflated by the Arkansas defeat.

Saturday's game at Bloomington will be the Frogs' second with the Hoosiers. In their previous meeting in 1941, also in Bloomington, TCU defeated Indiana 20 to 14.

A&M's chances for an upset over the Tigers got a boost when passer Beryl Batty reported back to practice Wednesday minus the sore ankle hurt in San Antonio. Batty has been looking good in practice and will get plenty of opportunity to raise his completion average tomorrow night.

The coaching staff will be spread over the country this week with Charlie DeWarr driving to Fayetteville for the Arkansas-Baylor game, and Marty Karow making the TCU-Indiana tilt in Bloomington, Indiana.

Bill DuBose and Bones Irvin will accompany the team to Baton Rouge, and "Dog" Dawson will help there with the spotting.

Assistant Freshman Coach Bob Gary is staying on the campus to handle the freshman scrimmage tomorrow.

The team will arrive at the scene of the game early in the morning, and will sleep in the Pullmans until time for the morning workout.
