

Tigers Take 26-6 Win From Riesel In League Match

A&M Consolidated got off to a good start in district competition Friday night, when the Tigers mangled the Riesel Indians 26-6 at Tiger Field.

Mainsprings in the Tiger at tack were quarterback Red Cash-ion and speedy halfback Johnny Cooley. Cooley crossed the double stripe three times for Consolidated, once on a pass from Cashion, and twice on 12 and 9 yard runs. Cashion did a fine job of ball-handling and completed 4 out of 7 passes, two for touchdowns.

The Tigers started the rout early in the first period. After recovering a partly blocked punt, they rolled up three straight first downs and a score, with Cooley gallcping around end for the final 12 yards.

Consolidated tallied on a 72 yard march early in the second quarter, with Cooley slicing through tackle from nine yards out for the T. D. Riesel's lone six points came in this period also. Halfback James Wolf smashed through center to score for Riesel.

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
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
