

Maroons Win 28-0 In Freshman Game

In a freshman intrasquad game on Kyle Field Saturday afternoon the maroon team, led by quarterback Glenn Lippman, trounced the whites, composed of the second and third freshman elevens, 28-0.

Approximately fifteen hundred fans divided their attention between the game on the field and the upsets being broadcast as Texas, S.M.U., and Arkansas fell to underdog foes.

The whites did not go down without a fight as they had a score called back when Augie Saxe went out tackle in a fifty yard sprint to the maroon goal. Penalties also hindered the whites whenever they would get an offense moving.

Lippman went over twice for the maroons, with Lemmons and Tidwell racking up the other two scores for the maroons. Lippman was the star of the afternoon when he was demonstrating his brand of ball handling.

His first score came after the Maroons had driven down to within the white five yard line. Lippman went over right guard for one yard. Lippman scored again later in the game when he went over right tackle again from the white 31 all the way for a score.

Lemmons' score came after a pass interception by guard Bob Davidson. Lemmons dashed over from inside the five yard line. Lemmons was kept pretty well bottled up by the whites throughout the game.

Billy Tidwell of Hearne ended the scoring for the day with a seventy yard punt return in the last quarter. Tidwell took the ball on his own thirty, started slow to allow time for his blocking to form and then was on his way.

Robert Shaeffer of El Paso made all the conversions for the Maroon squad. Shaeffer has also

been looking good in the half-back slot recently. Shaeffer was also tried at fullback during the game.

Several players traded jerseys late in the game in order to practice the passing attack. Cashif among these were Gerald Bowen, first string quarterback, and first string fullback Dresser.

The middle of the line was tough for both teams to penetrate throughout the game. Most of the gains made were either at tackle or around end. The line do not have a fullback weighing over 150 pounds on the squad.

The back showing the most improvement since the maroon game was quarterback Gerald Bowen of Corsicana. Bowen's ball handling, while still pretty rough in spots, was considerably better than last year.

Several of the whites are suffering from injuries received in practice this fall. Among these are Yale Lary of Ft. Worth, Jim Dobbyn of Abilene, Clarence "Bull" Lawson of Wichita Falls, and others. The coaches hope to have these men in shape for the TCU Pollack game Thursday afternoon on Kyle Field.

Farmers Out to Avenge Last Year's 26-0 Mauling by TCU

The Texas Aggies make their 1948 home football debut this week against a team they've been "wanting" for one year. That would be TCU, which mauled the Aggies, 26-0, last year in Fort Worth.

The licking received at the hands of the Horned Frogs didn't stop a win streak, nor did it keep the Ags from winning the title. It's just that the Aggies didn't like the manner in which the Frogs pushed them around and come Saturday afternoon at Kyle Field, they intend to do something about it.

Bob Goode, Jim Winkler, Calvin Dupree, Odell Stutzberger, Charley Wright, Marion Settegast and Beryl Baty are among Aggies who will be facing Ditch Meyer's Froggies for the final time.

Coach Harry Stiteler expects TCU to be a two or three touch-down favorite over his team, but he fully expects the Aggies to perform better on Kyle Field than they have in the road tilts at Philadelphia, San Antonio, Norman, Okla., and Baton Rouge, La. Too, Stiteler believes some of his Aggie reserves have come along in the non-conference games to the extent they will be of more value to the team against TCU.

Business Manager C. D. Ownby reported an increase in ticket sales this week. Six thousand tickets were sent to TCU and if they are sold, some 25,000 fans may witness the Saturday afternoon battle.

TCU will be fighting for survival in the Southwest Conference flag race, having lost to Arkansas 27-14, last week. It will be the Aggies' first of six successive league games. Baylor, Arkansas, SMU, Rice and Texas follow the Frogs on the Aggie slate.

Joe Gordon of the Cleveland Indians this season became the fourth active player in the American League to hit over 200 homers. Joe DiMaggio, Rudy York and Ted Williams are the others.

Another out was almost scored after the game when a hurried Aggie nearly emasculated himself when he got tangled up in a picket fence. Rideout also patched him up.

Turn about fair play was the Louisiana school's motto Friday night as they held a midnight yell practice in front of the Aggies' hotel. Many of the Cadets trying to sleep in the lobby after a long trip complained of the noise nuisance.

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Tigers Take 26-6 Win From Riesel In League Match

A&M Consolidated got off to a good start in district competition Friday night, when the Tigers mangled the Riesel Indians 26-6 at Tiger Field.

Mainsprings in the Tiger attack were quarterback Red Cashion and speedy halfback Johnny Cooley. Cooley crossed the double strike three times for Consolidated, once on a pass from Cashion, and twice on 12 and 9 yard runs. Cashion did a fine job of ball-handling and completed 4 out of 7 passes, two for touchdowns.

The Tigers started the rout early in the first period. After recovering a partly blocked punt, they rolled up three straight first downs and a score, with Cooley galloping around end for the final 12 yards.

Consolidated tallied on a 72 yard march early in the second quarter, with Cooley slicing through tackle from nine yards out for the T. D. Riesel's lone six points came in this period also. Halfback James Wolf smashed through center to score for Riesel.

The last two Tiger markers came in the third and fourth quarters, both on passes from Cashion. Cooley scored the third frame T. D. on a 14 yard toss from Cashion, and big right end Dickie Dowell snagged a one yard jump pass, also from Cashion, for the final score.
