Wilcox Speaks On Federal Aid For Education

The Freshman Discussion and Debate Club at its third meeting Monday night heard Dr. G. B. Wilcox, chairman of the Department of Education, discuss the topic "Federal Aid to Education."

The purpose of Dr. Wilcox's talk was to lay a foundation of subject matter on which the club members may begin study of this year's intercollegiate debate question: "Resolved, that the federal government should adopt a policy of equalizing educational opportunities in tax supported schools by means of annual grants."

The organization, sponsored by Milford Allen, of the Department of English, will, during the year, hear similar programs designed to stimulate discussion within the group. Allen explained that, while the organization is interested in debate and will attempt to arrange debates with freshman groups of other colleges, it is as much interested in cultivating a desire for understanding of contemporary problems.

Allen said that the vitality of the club will not depend upon its having a large membership, but he extended an invitation of membership to all freshmen who may be interested.

4 Dairy Husbandry Majors to Attend Contest Oct. 20

Four men from the Dairy Husbandry 307 class, accompanied by J. G. Feato, professor of dairy husbandry, will leave for Atlantic City New Jersey, October 20 to engage in the Senior Intercollegiate Dairy Products Judging Contest on October 25, Feato said Monday.

Each contestant will judge ten samples of market milk, vanilla ice cream, creamery butter, and American cheese.

The two top teams are entitled to elect one member of their team to receive the Tow Award Fellowship. This award gives the member \$850 for work towards a Master's Degree.

Started in 1916, the contest was first entered by A&M in 1938. Teams from each of the 25 schools in the United States and Canada with a dairy husbandry unit compete.

This year schools from foreign countries have been invited to the contest.

Enrollments Rise In Three Out Of Five SWC Colleges

While the University of Texas and Southern Methodist University reported decided drops in enrollment, A&M, Baylor and TCU added to their previous registrations totals this year. As a whole, there are fewer students enrolled in the larger schools of Texas this year than were last year.

The University of Texas reported 16,991 students registered for the 1948-49 session—a drop of 509 from last year's 17,500. During the war years TU averaged 18,000.

Southern Methodist also suffered an enrollment loss, but by its own hand. Students were being rejected in an attempt to hold down the enrollment figure. Last year's all-time high of 7,031 dropped to 6,800 this year.

Texas Christian enrollment eased past the 5000 mark and is expected to draw even to last year's peak of 5749 by the end of the school year.

Baylor's enrollment topped the previous count by 466 students. Despite the decrease in the number of GI's Baylor now has 5,054 registered. This is the first year in the school's 102-year-old history that the enrollment has been more than 5000.

5537 students, both corp men and GI's, barely slipped past last year's total by about 25 students at A&M.

Quirey Elected New President Of Arts and Sciences Council

Jack A. Quirey was elected President of the Arts and Sciences Council during the initial meeting of that group Tuesday afternoon. The council elected J. B. Rochelle Secretary-Treasurer.

M. T. Harrington, Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, told the group that the council serves as a personal contact between the Dean and the students. He explained that the council helps to coordinate the work of the School of Arts and Sciences as far as student activities are concerned.

The organization consists of the presidents of student clubs sponsored by departments in the School of Arts and Sciences. If there are no organizations sponsored by a department, the head of that department appoints a junior or senior student who is majoring in that department as its representative on the council. The editor of The Commentator is a member of the group.

Meyers, Camera Club; Jack A. Quirey, Physical Education; Robert B. Baty, Education; Paul E. Parker, Mathematics; Walter L. Brown, History; Kenneth Bond, Journalism; and J. T. Miller, Editor of The Commentator. Moore and Baty were the only members not present for the first session.

Harrington stated that the council fund consisted of \$153.04. This sum was the one-third of the net profits from the '48 Follies which the School of Arts and Sciences received for its work in the production.

Three representatives from the council are to be appointed by President Quirey to serve on a central committee for All-College Day. The Agriculture Council and the Engineers Council will have three members each on the nine man group. This nine man central committee will coordinate plans for the event.

Future meetings of the council will be held at 5 p. m. on those Wednesdays which will designate by the President of the council.

Student rating of courses was placed on the agenda for the next meeting.
