"Veteran Justiors are getting be-hind in the schedule for having their pictures taken," Earl Rose, Longhorn co-editor, warned today


"Though this is only the third day, the number of students who have had their pictures taken is far below the number who should have reported to the Aggieland Studio." Rose gaid.


