

Pic Schedule For Junior Veterans Set for Week

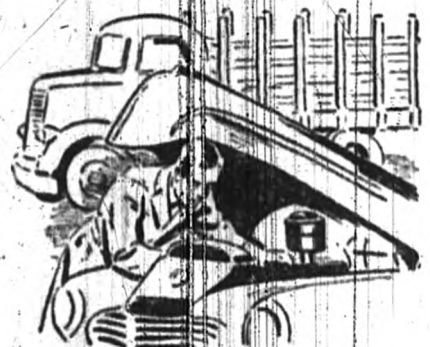

Pagot to Discuss African Livestock

Dr. G. R. Pagot, animal husbandry specialist from Paris, France, will speak on "Livestock Types, Production and Breeding in French West Africa" Friday at 4 p. m. in the A&I Lecture Room, according to Dr. Bob Shrode of the Genetics Department.

Pagot has conducted research in animal breeding in French West Africa for several years, working with cattle, sheep, and goats, Shrode stated.

The Southwest Conference Sportsmanship Award was inaugurated last year by J. K. B. Nelson, corps editor of The Battalion for 1947 and 1948.

Southern Methodist was chosen as the first school to receive the trophy, the selection being based on ballots cast by SWC school representatives and officials of the conference. It was awarded at the annual SWC track meet on May 16 in Houston.

"This meeting," Munroe concluded, "should go a long way toward improving sportsmanship among the seven conference schools, and judging by the letters we have received, we have the backing of just about everybody in the conference."
