Sheep and Goat Raisers Hold Quarterly Meet

The quarterly meeting of the board of directors of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association is now in session on the A&M campus. The meeting began Wednesday and will continue through Friday.

Clayton Pickett, president of the Association, Earnest Williams, secretary, and some two hundred other directors and their families are attending the meet.

A dance, to which the Association had invited members of the Saddle and Siroloin Club, was held Wednesday evening at the Grove.

Nine committees of the Association's board met Thursday morning to discuss local and international matters concerning the sheep and goat industry. Association officials stated:

Chancellor Gibb Gilchrist welcomed the association to the campus at a business session Thursday morning in the Sibus Banquet Room. Vice-chancellor D. W. Williams presided over the A&M System's part of the meeting and Dr. J. C. Miller, head of the Animal Husbandry Department, discussed the objectives of his department.

The directors will inspect college facilities Saturday morning and see the A&M-TCU football game that afternoon.

Dr. Ijams to Be Guest Speaker At A-M Church

Dr. E. H. Ijams, associate minister, counselor, and director of education at the Central Church of Christ in Nashville, Tennessee will be guest speaker at the A&M Church of Christ, October 17 to 24.

In addition to regular evangelistic services, Dr. Ijams is scheduled to deliver special lectures relating to pre-marital and marital problems.

Sunday morning will be "Marriage is a Serious Business." Other topics tentatively scheduled are "Foundations of Love, Marriage and Happiness, Pillars of Permanence for Your Success and Happiness, Why Homes, Christianity and Religion for Home and Family."

Upon invitation from Dan Russell of the A&M College, Dr. Ijams will address three different sections of "The Family." These lectures will be given in Room 203 of the Agriculture Building.

Dr. Ijams will also deliver a series of talks on "Messages to Mothers" on Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday of next week, at 10 each morning, in the Church Building.

The lineman that is expected to give Bremond the most trouble is end Dickie, Dowell, whose pass snatching average this year is outstanding.

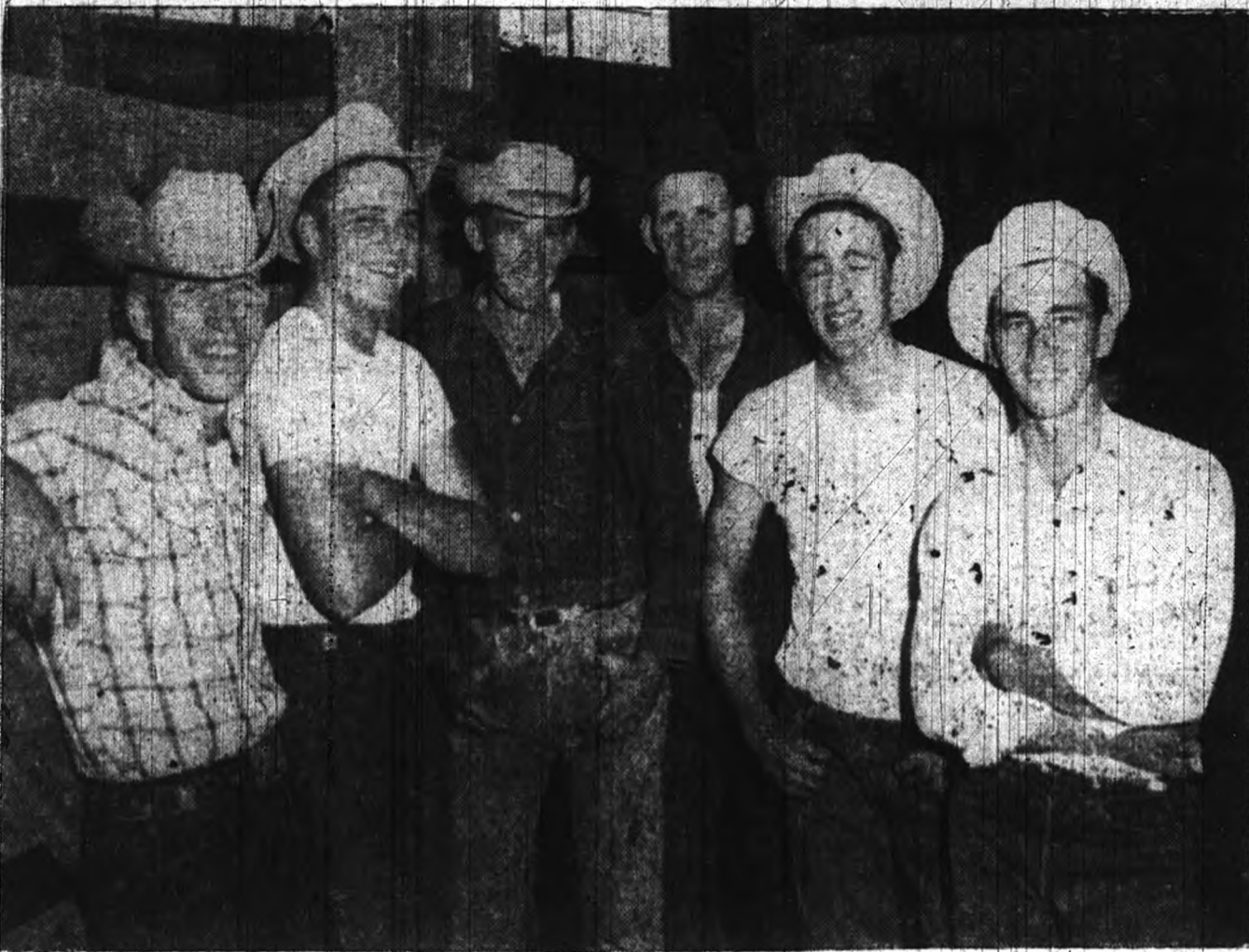
Bremond has gone undefeated this year in three games. They rolled over Lot 28-0, Riesel 13-6, and Marquet 6-0.

For two thirty-minute intermissions the Aggie Ramblers will play for the dance, but for the rest of the time the Aggieland Orchestra will keep up the music. The dance is to sound out the weekend of the TCU game and Aggie Rodeo.

This year the Aggieland Orchestra will have a male and female singer, according to Bill Turner, director of the organization. Billy Jean Barron is the girl, and Tommy Butler, is the male singer. They will sing at the dance Saturday night.

Tickets for the Dance can be bought in advance at the Student Activities Office, Friday from 8 to 5 and Saturday from 8 until 12 noon.

The Senior Ring dance date was set for April 22, at a meeting of the Senior Class held last night, Don Kaspar, president of the Senior Class, announced. After discussing several dates, it was decided that this was the best, he said.

1918 Class To Hold Reunion October 16-17

The Class of '18 will hold its 30th annual reunion on Saturday and Sunday, October 16 and 17.

The last reunion was held in 1938, which was the 20th for the class of '18.

Dick Hervey of the Former Students Association said that the activities will begin with registration in the YMCA lobby at 10 Saturday morning. Following the registration the class will have lunch before going to the game at 2 where they will sit in a special section with their families.

A dinner-dance is planned at Maggie Parker's Dining Room in Bryan at 7 Saturday night. The program will consist of a series of talks. H. L. Heaton, Registrar, will talk on enrollment and enrollment trends at A&M; Harry Boyer, Director of Housing, will speak on the housing situation; and J. Wayne Stark, Director of the Student Memorial Center, will tell the group about the proposed student center.

E. E. McQuillen will talk about the A&M Development Fund, and Dick Hervey will speak about the activities of former students.

Sunday morning at 8 the class members and their sons will have breakfast in Sibus Dining Hall. After breakfast the class will hold its business meeting with Joe Grace, class president, and J. W. Williams, class agent, presiding.

Speakers for the meeting will be Harry Stiteler, head football coach, W. R. Carmichael, Athletic Director, and Reece Spence, head of the Office of Physical Plant. Stiteler and Carmichael will speak on the athletic program and football at A&M. Spence will talk on the physical development of the College.

Following the class meeting the group will make a tour of the campus, and after the tour the meeting will be adjourned.

A&M Band to March at Half

The 155-piece A&M band plans to put on a halftime show for A&M-TCU football game on Kyle Field Saturday. This will mark the band's second appearance for a football game this year.

"The band will execute several difficult maneuvers which should please everyone," Lt. Col. E. V. Adams, band director, said.

Band drill will consist of four parts, according to Col. Adams. Precision drill, consisting of minstrel turns and flank movements, will constitute the first part. The next three parts will be salutes to TCU, Head Coach Harry Stiteler, and the Twelfth Man.

The TCU salute will be in the form of moving letters formed in a reverse manner, Col. Adams said. The salutes to Stiteler and the Twelfth Man will be supplemented by the corps.

The band will be host to the Purple and White Band of TCU prior to the game. The two bands will eat in Duncan Mess Hall.

Seventy-five contestants are scheduled to participate in the six main event Aggie Rodeo tonight and tomorrow night in the AH Pavilion.

Final preparations for the rodeo have been completed and the event will take place at eight tonight. Show time will be at 7:30 p. m. Saturday. The Rodeo, which is sponsored by the Saddle and Siroloin Club, is directed by Jim Gray of the AH Department.

The six main events include saddle bronc riding, bull riding, barrel racing, calf roping, bull-dogging, and wild steer ribbon roping. In addition there will be several special events. One will be a cutting horse exhibition by Flying H ridden by Volney Blythe. Flying H is considered to be one of the top cutting horses in the nation. Another special event is the cowboy's blower race.

Aren't director for the two day event will be Tommy Johnson, a senior AH student from Beville. Competing in the contest will be L. E. Griffith of Dallas, who was winner of the saddle bronc riding at the Cow Palace in San Francisco in 1939, and Charles Rankin of Corsicana, champion all-around cowboy who won the title last year.

Corps Seniors will sit in Section 132 immediately behind the band at all three home games, according to the unanimous decision of the executive Committee of the Student Senate last night.

This was decided because the non-military students used this section almost exclusively last year despite whose time it was to sit there, Chuck Malise said.

John Orr, chairman of the committee, suggested that corps members have their dates wait in this section while the cadets march in as this will be a good centralized position for picking them up.

The lower half of the student section will be roped off and 30 extra ODs plus volunteer student senators will be on hand to see that this area is reserved for the cadet corps, Orr said.

The committee also discussed the proposed change in the Aggie War Hymn as that subject had been referred to them by the committee from the senior class and veterans.

"No six men in school are capable of making a decision with such far reaching effects as this," Orr said. Therefore, the committee has placed the subject on the agenda for the next meeting of the entire student senate. A letter has been sent to all student senators asking them to take a test of opinion on the proposed change in the areas which they represent.
