Lippman also turned in some convenient blocks when his mates were carrying the ball. Everything considered, Lippman was the outstanding back on the field.

The Polliwogs couldn't relax when Lippman wasn't carrying the leather because any one of the numerous Aggie halfbacks that entered and left the Maroon and White line up could go all the way at any time. One, Jim Dobbyn of Abilene, did return a TCU punt all the way.

Outstanding in the Fish backfield were Jim Dobbyn, Karl Hollier, Billy Tidwell, Jerry Crossman, Robert Shaeffer, Aggie Saxe, Homer Dear, and Bernard Lemmons. These freshmen all are dangerous from anywhere on the grid and all played a fine game.

The punting duties were handled by Mae Skoeltje for the Fish. The punting average for the game for the freshmen was 42.5 yards.

The TCU team received the opening kick defending the South goal. Glenn Lippman and Bob Davidson had been elected co-captains by their teammates, with Alton Taylor and Bob McEarchern representing TCU in the flip of the coin ceremony.

The first score of the ball game came the second time the Fish went on the offensive. The Aggie team took the ball on their own 22 after a kick off the foot of Duane Grissett rolled off the field of play.

Lippman made a yard at left end, Karl Hollier made a first on the 36, Lippman then took a pitch out from Quarterback Gerald Bowen, cut over right end, eluded several tacklers and sixty-four yards later crossed the double stripe standing up. Lippman outran several men in the Polliwog backfield on his way to the score.

Lippman brought the crowd to its feet again later in the first quarter when he made a beautiful 89 yard dash to the goal off guard. The spectators returned to their seats a moment later when the play was called back because the Fish team had been offside.

The Wogs came fighting back in the second quarter after Bowen

kicked out on the 24 yard line of the Fish from the three. John Ethridge, Bartosh's substitute, swept right end to the Aggie 20 and then made nothing at center. Ethridge then passed to Polliwog blocking back Bill Mattern on the five yard line. Jack Ray then went over in two tries at center.

Tackle Robert Fulton missed his second try at the extra point after his first kick was nullified by a holding penalty. Robert Shaeffer of El Paso had missed the point on the Aggie score under identical circumstances.

The second Fish touchdown was set up in the third quarter when Aggie end Jack Jones blocked a fourth down punt on the TCU 19 yard line. Karl Hollier carried over from the five six plays later. The Aggies seemed to have more scores enched in later plays only to have something go wrong.

## Aggies And Frogs Meet In 44th Grid Battle Here Tomorrow

Texas Christian University invades College Station this weekend to renew their ancient grid rivalry with the Texas Aggies. The two schools' football teams will clash at 2:30 tomorrow afternoon on Kyle Field.

The Horned Frogs and the Aggies have met in 43 previous gridiron battles with the Aggies winning 24 and the Frogs winning 15. Four of the contests have ended in a tie.

Last year TCU upset a favored Aggie team in Fort Worth when they scored four touchdowns and held the Aggies at bay. The final score of that game was, TCU 26, A&M 0.

This year the story should be different. A&M will be the underdog and the game will be played on Kyle Field.

Coch. Harry Stittlet held a secret practice on Kyle Field last night and he will hold another, but lighter, workout this afternoon. The Aggie coaches were non-committal on the probable outcome of the game but they do appear to have the squad ready for anything that the Horned Frogs can throw at them.

Many Aggie fans are anxious to see what the coaching staff

and the team have cooked up in their secret practices this week.

This will be the first time this year that the Aggies have played against any formation except the T. TCU Coach Dutch Meyer is a strict advocate of the single and double wing formations.

Tomorrow's game will be the first conference tilt of the season for the Aggies while it will be the second league game for the Frogs. TCU is only less so far this season was in their conference opener with Arkansas. The Razorbacks won that contest 27 to 14.

A&M opens their bid for the conference crown with one of the worst pre-season records an Aggie team has ever had. The Cadets have lost four straight to Villanova, Texas Tech, Oklahoma and LSU in that order.

On the other hand TCU has won all three of their inter-sectional games downing Kansas, Oklahoma

A&M and Indiana in that order.

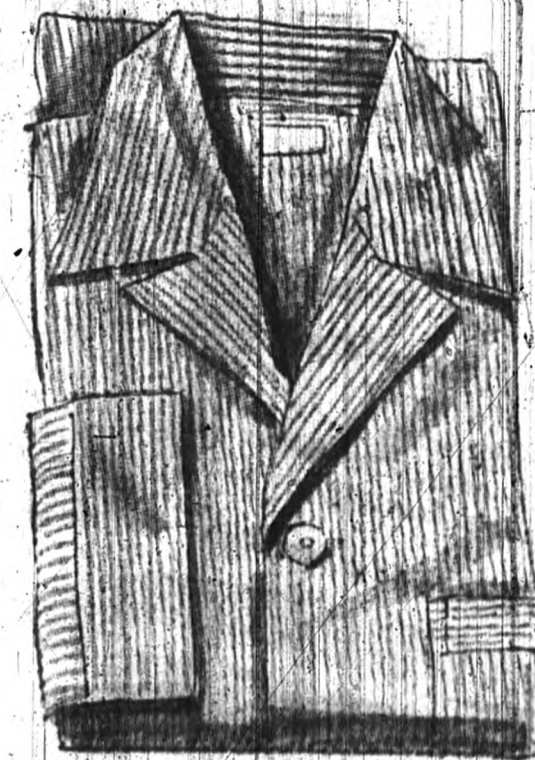
