

Water Polo Team Plays Texas Here

A&M's water polo team will open its 1948 season against the Texas University swimmers in P. L. Downs Natatorium Wednesday night. This exhibition dual meet will be a preview of which team will win the conference crown as A&M and Texas are rated co-favorites over the other competing schools.

Two games will be played Wednesday night, the "B" teams competing at 7:00, and the top squads at 7:45.

Captain Art Adamson has practically the same team back which won the league crown with ease last year, but the second-place Longhorns have some good swimmers from their championship swimming team.

Aggie Coach Art Adamson will meet with Texas Coach Tex Robertson Tuesday night to discuss rules and an admission charge to the game.

Adamson stated yesterday that if there is any admission charge, it will be small.

The starting lineup for the Aggie "A" squad water polo team is full of stars from the Aggie swimming team. Adamson's tentative starting list is as follows: Gene Summers, center back; Danny Green, left back; Paul Fleming or Van Adamson, right back; Johnny Heeman, center forward; Jerry Fisher, right forward; and Ed Kruse, goalie.

Opposing them on the Longhorn water bowlers' team will be: Jack Tolar, Jim McCann, Bobby Hill, Wally Pryor, Joe Demmer, Eddie Gilbert, and Bob Tarleton.

Last season the Aggies went through the season undefeated, but the strong Texas team may be more troublesome this year. A&M has more experienced second string splashers than does the Texas squad, and should win most of its "B" team matches.

Water polo is a good spectators game, and is very watch. Most of the roughness normally attributed to this sport, is avoided by the conference rules, and the emphasis is placed on team work rather than on "organized drowning" as it is used to be.

"E" Field dominated play against "F" Air Force as they won 18 to 0. With a defensive line that couldn't be broken, the redlegs held the flyboys down and refused to allow them a 40 yard punting. Ben Templeton of "C" Air Force scored the only touchdown in the game with "D" Air Force, the final score ending 6 to 0.

Intramural football was held at the Field Artillery until they finally broke out to win a 14 to 6 game.

Only one basketball game was played Monday. "A" Flight dropped "B" Vets by a 23 to 10 score indicating a lop-sided game on "A" Flight's part.

On the tennis courts, "A" ASA set down "A" Veterans, winning two sets out of three. "C" Infantry swept their sets with "D" Field taking all three with little trouble.

Aggies to Workout in Secret While Preparing for Baylor

After two straight close losses, the Aggie varsity went through a secret practice on Kyle Field yesterday. Coach Harry Stiteler had intended to keep Monday practice open to the public, but switched his plans after the narrow loss to TCU.

Several new plays were practiced against the freshman team and the B squad in preparation for the Baylor game in Waco. A&M's last victory came against the Bears on Kyle Field last year. The two teams were rated equal then, but the strong green and gold squad will rate at least three touchdowns better than the Aggies this year.

All of the starters except the

quarterbacks loosened up instead of working out yesterday. Missing from the field was Odell Stautzenberger, out with a sprained ankle, and Ray Whitaker, out with a head injury.

Bob Goode suffered a cut on his head during the game, but appeared to be fit as he jogged around the field.

The varsity alternated on the offense and defense, but the coaches concentrated on a pass defense to halt the Bear's aerial attack.

Coach Charlie DeWare brought back a part of the Bears in their game against Texas Tech. He said that Baylor appeared to be thinking too much about the Aggie game, and couldn't get going very well in the soggy field against the Raiders.

The secret practice schedule will continue in effect until further notice, Coach Stiteler said. All would-be spectators are asked to cooperate with the team managers in keeping out of the stadium.

Weightlifters To Form Club

Enough interest has been shown for a Weight Lifting Club to be formed on the campus and organization of this club will take place Thursday afternoon.

Initial meeting will be held in the Intramural Office Thursday afternoon at 5 p.m. The Club will have as its sponsors, Spike White and Barney Welch.

Michigan Takes Over First Place In Batt Football Poll

Michigan took over the top spot among the Nation's football teams this week after their crushing 28 to 0 defeat of last week's number one team—The Northwestern Wildcats. Northwestern dropped to seventh place in the standings compiled by the Batt Staff.

Notre Dame retained their second place position as they rolled over Nebraska 44 to 13. California moved up to third place as they trounced Oregon State, 42 to 0.

North Carolina skidded out of the top three because of the rough time they had in overcoming North Carolina State, 14 to 0.

Army moved up a notch to fifth place while Georgia Tech dropped to sixth place. Army defeated an exceptionally good Harvard team 20 to 6 while Georgia Tech was whipping Auburn 27 to 0.

The SMU Mustangs helped their cause nationally when they took a surprisingly easy win from Rice 33 to 7. SMU was rated eighth in this week's poll (a one notch jump over their last week's position).

Pennsylvania and Missouri rounded out the top ten. Penn took ninth place because of their 20 to 14 defeat of Columbia. Missouri whipped Navy, 35 to 14.

Five members of the Batt Sports Staff voted on the top ten teams and all five men put Michigan on top.

In the national league the Chicago Bears pace the western division by one game while the Philadelphia Eagles lead the eastern half by only half a game.

The San Francisco 49ers enjoy only a half game lead over Cleveland in the All-America's western division race. In the eastern division the Baltimore Colts are two games in front of the runner-up New York Yankees and Buffalo Bills.

The Bears crushed the Detroit Lions, 28 to 0, yesterday to stay in front of the defending champion Chicago Cardinals. The Cards ripped the New York Giants, 63-35.

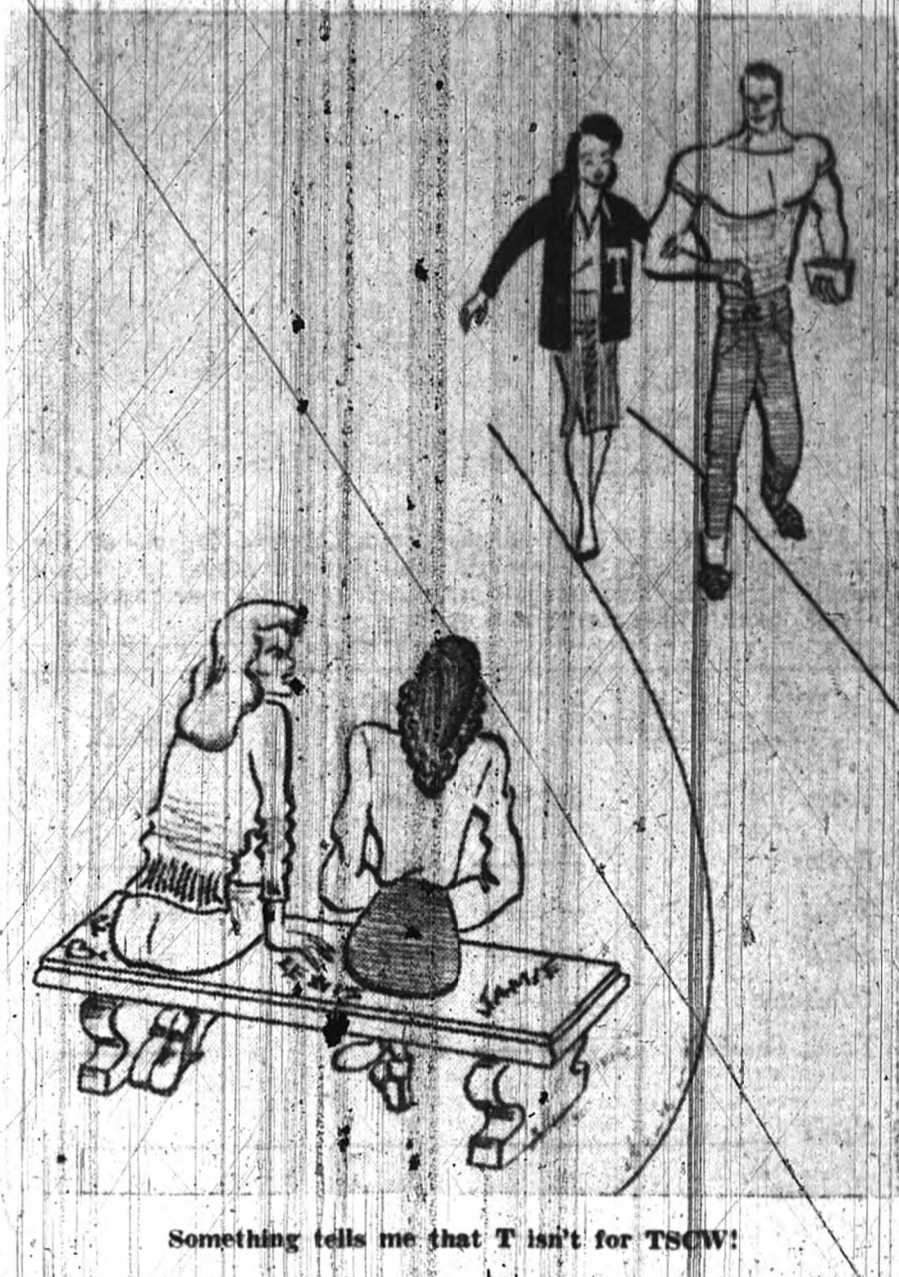
