India Missionary Speaks Friday At Episcopal Chapel

Brinkley S. Snowden, Episcopal missionary, will be in Collee Station at St. Thomas' Chapel Parish Hall Friday, October 22 at 7 p. m. to speak on his travels and missionary work in India. Rev. Orin Helvey has announced.

Snowden, a native of Memphis, Tennessee, is a graduate of Hill School and the University of Tennessee. In 1935, he was appointed a missionary in India where he and Mrs. Snowden worked until 1939.

Snowden served as secretary-treasurer of the Kotacri Missionary Union, which includes as members missionaries from all over the world; and as president of the Singareni Collieries Social Club, composed of Moslems, Hindus, Parsees and Christians.

Snowden will show pictures taken by himself and several other films showing work among the Moslems, Rev. Helvey said.
