Church Supper Treats

I feel sorry for anyone who's never been to a church supper. The turkey, or chicken pie, or macaroni and cheese, or hot potato salad, or butternut or sour cream pie served are all dishes that can be made at home. But somehow or other the angels seem to inspire "the ladies" when they're cooking for a church event and never been to one at which the food didn't taste heavenly.

I'll never forget the kidney beans baked in maple syrup that I tasted—several summers back—at a Vermont church supper. Or the simple dish of homegrown beefsteak tomatoes cut in thick slices, beautiful beyond words on a milk glass plate, and seasoned beyond description with vinegar, sugar, fresh basil. And still another time the same tomatoes with another subtle seasoning—was it tarragon?

A reminder of all good church suppers has just come into my kitchen. It's *The Inglebrook Cookbook*, recently published by Harper and Brothers (New York) \$2. The recipes in it were chosen from more than five thousand submitted by church people in response to a call by the Brethren Publishing House for reliable and wholesome cooking rules. The cookbook has the usual categories from breads to vegetables, including chapters on "International Cookery" and one simply called "One Dish."

Anyone who likes homespun recipes will enjoy this cookbook—even the way many of the recipes are written will give you great enjoyment. Take this one, for instance, contributed by Mrs. Lulu Sanger Dull, of Los Angeles, California:

Cheese Apple Crisp
Ingredients: 3 quarts apples, 1/2 cup water, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 2 cups flour, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 pound butter, 3/4 pound grated cheese.
Method: Arrange sliced apples in shallow greased baking pan. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Add water and lemon juice. Combine sugar, flour and salt; work in butter to form a crumbly mixture. Lightly stir in grated cheese. Spread mixture over apples and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, until apples are tender and crust is brown and crisp. Serves 25.—Mrs. Pearl Hoover, Harrisonburg, Va.

Chicken and Celery Casserole
Ingredients: 2 cups chopped celery, 4 tablespoons chicken fat, 4 tablespoons flour, 2 tablespoons salt, dash of pepper, 1 cup chicken stock, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup water, 2 cups cooked chicken, 1 cup corn flakes, 2 tablespoons melted butter or margarine.
Method: Cook celery until tender; drain, saving water. Heat chicken fat, stir in flour, salt and pepper. Gradually add chicken stock, milk and water drained from celery, stirring until smooth. Cook until thickened stirring constantly. Spread layer of chicken in greased casserole. Add layer of cooked chicken, 1 cup corn flakes that have been crushed into fine crumbs and mixed with melted butter or margarine. Bake in a moderately hot (400 degrees F.) oven about 10 minutes or until thoroughly heated. Makes 6 servings.

Cinnamon Shaw
Ingredients: 3 apples, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/4 cup cinnamon, 1/2 cup raisins, 1 cup cabbage, 1/2 cup mayonnaise.
Method: Cook diced apples, cinnamon candies and raisins together, covered for 5 minutes, and allow to get cold without lifting lid. When ready to serve add mayonnaise to shredded cabbage, then a piece. Makes a beautiful salad.

Orange Glazed Sweet Potatoes
Ingredients: 4 1/2 pounds boiled sweet potatoes, 1 1/2 cups brown sugar, 1 1/2 cups white sugar, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 1/2 cups

orange juice, 1/4 cup butter, 1 tablespoon salt.
Method: Arrange sliced sweet potatoes in buttered baking pan. Combine sugars and cornstarch; add orange juice. Cook 5 minutes, stirring constantly. Add butter and salt. Pour over potatoes. Bake in a moderate oven for 25 minutes. Serves 20.—Mrs. Pearl Hoover, Harrisonburg, Va.

State Voting Rules Given By AAUW

In an effort to get every registered voter in Brazos county to go to the polls and cast an officially correct ballot, which will not be thrown out for minor technicalities, the Legislative committee of the Bryan-College Station Branch of the American Association of University Women, has prepared the following list of facts pertinent to voting, taken from the "Instruction Card to Voters" which is placed in all voting booths on election day.

This is not a political effort. No attempt is being made to tell voters for whom they should vote. It is a simple endeavor to get all voters to vote so that their votes will count.

"A voter shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election, and the last six months within the county in which he or she offers to vote. He or she votes in the precinct in which he or she is residing on election day.

"No election judge shall use any other language other than English in aiding a voter. No voter shall use other than the English language in explaining how he wishes to vote.

"A voter should take his poll tax receipt to the polls.

"A voter should not carry marked papers, ballots, or written instructions to the polls.

"Use only black ink or pencil in marking a ballot. Such marks should not be visible from the back side.

"The ballot will bear the signature of the precinct chairman on the back, and will have a number assigned to it after the voter has folded it and handed it to the election judge, which is according to the laws of the State of Texas.

"Mark a line through the name of candidate or candidates you desire to vote against.

"When a voter desires to vote a straight ticket, he shall run a pencil or pen through all other tickets on the official ballot. And when he shall desire to vote a mixed ticket, he shall do so by running a line through the names of such candidates as he shall desire to vote against in the ticket he is voting, and leave unscratched the names of candidates he desires to vote for."
