Copeland's establishment is definitely all new. The building location of Cope's Confectionery was just completed at the end of this summer. The structure, while in its elementary stage had a lot of sidewalk-construction bosses shaking their heads at its unusual appearance.

Animal Husbandry Beef Cattle Herd Now Numbers 180

Composed of Hereford, Aberdeen-Angus, Shorthorn, and Brahman breeds, the beef cattle herd of the Animal Husbandry Department now numbers 180, according to J. K. Riggs, of the Animal Husbandry Department.

Cows, steers, bulls, and calves furnish material for graduate and undergraduate work. For Farmers Short Courses, 4-H Club Congress, State Vocational Agriculture Judging Contest, and Field Day for Breed Associations also draw on AH Department Stock.

Undergraduate work gives specific training in breeding, feeding, management, and disease control in the beef cattle field. Riggs said. Graduate work is designed to give a thorough survey of recent advances in beef production.

The herd is available for students of judging and feeding, for graduates in thesis problems and for research done by the Agricultural Experiment Station.

The research field is divided into research in beef cattle feeding, breeding, herd and pasture management, Agricultural Experiment Station, and did so until September of 1946. When he resigned, Copeland was Chief of the Dairy Division of the Experimentation Station.

Cope's Confectionery easily seats 50 persons. That of course refers to ordinary people, so there is no limit of the place's actual capacity when hungry Aggies are involved.

As yet the place has not expanded to handle all the service lines that Copeland hopes to have. He now carries a complete selection of ice cream, dairy products and fountain beverages. Copeland handles fresh bakery goods too.

Copeland has an idea which he believes can not miss. Conditions permitting, he hopes to establish a waffle breakfast on Sunday mornings from 8:30 through 12:00. Cope predicts a good turn out of late-sleeping Aggies seeking breakfast.

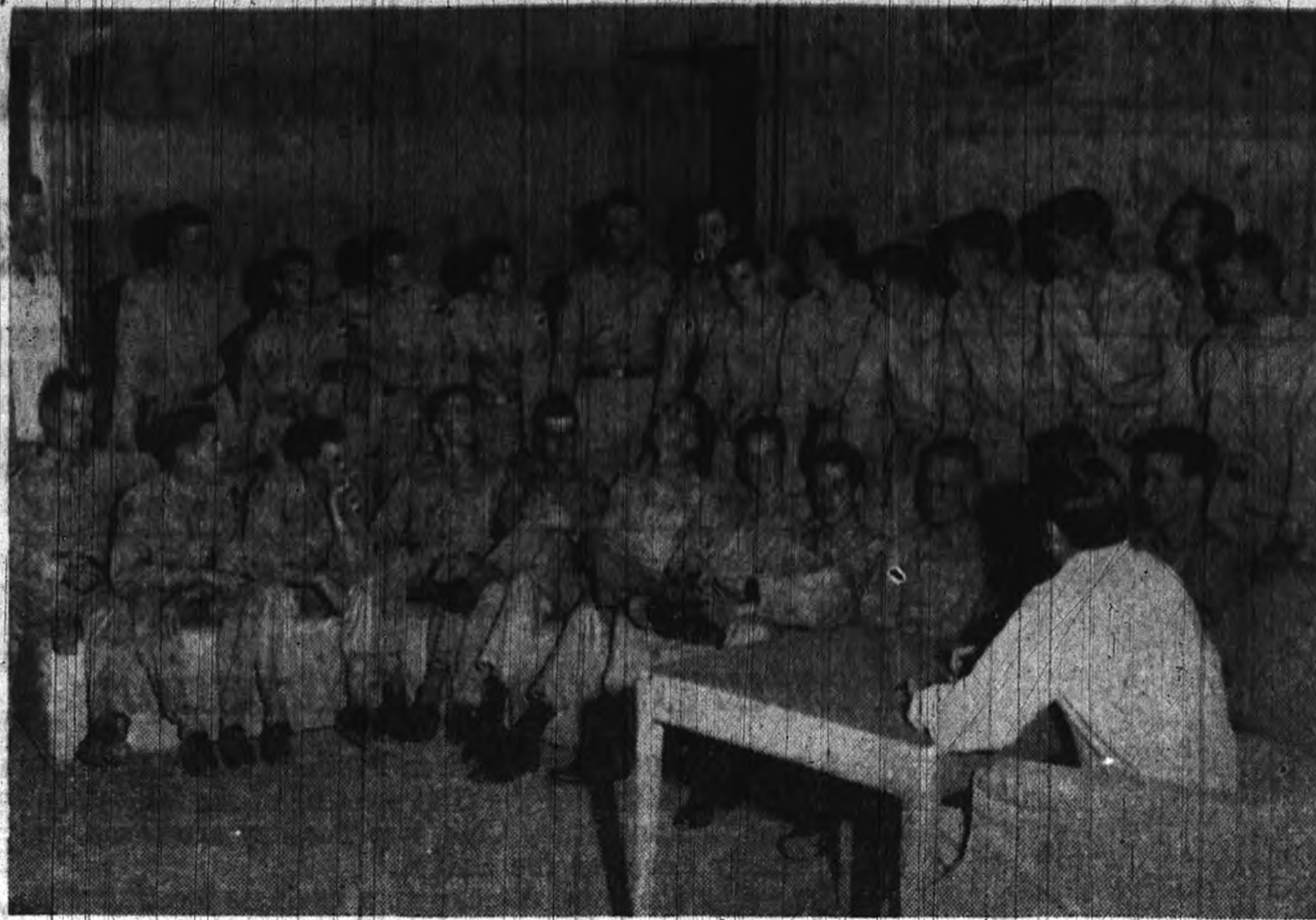

Darrow Returns From Vocational Meet in Detroit

Just in case those free blotters that currently adorn the desks of most A&M students have created an erroneous impression about their donor, we think a little explanation is in order. The donor is Herb Shaffer, and he isn't crazy.

M. D. Darrow, associate professor in teacher training on the Industrial Extension Service staff, has returned from a national conference in Detroit. The conference was held jointly by the American Vocational Association and representatives of the automotive industry. Much progress has been made in the standardization of training for high school teachers in automotive mechanics, Darrow reported.

Darrow is chairman of an advisory committee which sets up recommended standards for courses in automotive service and repair, and he has developed much material which is used throughout the nation by automotive mechanics teachers. In addition to his work with the AVA and automotive industry committee, Darrow also worked with a committee of the National Association of Teacher Trainers on development of additional material for teacher training courses in automotive mechanics.

"The complexity of modern motor vehicles is such that the adequate preparation of teachers in automotive mechanics is more important than ever," Darrow said. "Modern youngsters expect that their teachers will keep abreast of the latest developments in the automotive world and will offer material that is up-to-date. They also want the material to be well presented."

"More knowledge of mechanical principles and shop practices does not meet the need for men who are not only firmly grounded in practical phases, but are also trained in the presentation of their material through sound teaching," he added.

More than 300 Texas schools now use automotive mechanics material prepared by Darrow and presented by A&M.

The blotters, yours for the asking, are his way of getting acquainted with A&M and of getting A&M acquainted with Shaffer's Book Store, that new establishment that has taken over the spot formerly held by The College Book Store.

What's more, the name isn't the only thing that is new about the place. Shaffer has installed new sales equipment, and lighting fixtures, painted the interior, and generally rebuilt the depleted stock of materials and supplies. The conversation strayed to business, and before their cups were empty the deal was closed. However, the purchase was not as suddenly accomplished as it may seem. Shaffer had wanted to locate in College Station for the last five years.

Throughout his travels, which included schools in thirty six states, he has never found a school which, in his estimations, rivals A&M in spirit and friendliness. "I guess it's the straightforward way an Aggie steps up and shakes your hand when he meets you that I noticed first," says Shaffer.

He's a staunch follower of A&M sports too, and hasn't missed an A&M-Texas football game since 1937.

With the job of building a first class college bookstore well under way, Shaffer has big plans for the future. As a means of better serving Aggies, he plans to inaugurate a special order department through which students may order any item not in stock. Special instruments, lamps, magazines, and tobs are a few of the things to be available through the facilities of the department.

Soon to go into operation is a free gift wrapping service which will handle any gift regardless of where it was purchased. Another big feature will be the new record department which will include a 3000 record stock of releases from the leading companies.

"The basis of our business," says Shaffer, "is service to the students. We want to be able to supply anything they need and help them in any way we can." "We have had a grand response and business has been far better than we expected," says Pat Callahan, general manager. "We are very pleased because we want to be everyone's friend. We want to stay here."

1200 Now On Rolls Of Student Labor

Twelve hundred students, or 15 percent of the student body, are employed on the campus, G. A. Long, director of student labor, announced today.

The monthly payroll for this number of students is \$22,000.00. Most students receive 60 cents an hour, but the range is from 50 cents to \$1.25 an hour.

Workers in the mess hall comprise the largest single group of student jobs. Other jobs such as office assistants, laboratory assistants, and paper graders are listed.

The student labor office tries to weed out applicants that do not actually need assistance in financing their education, Long said.
