Composed of Hereford, Aberdeen-Angus, Shorthorn, and Brahman breeds, the beef cattle herd of the Animal Husbandry Department now numbers 180, according to J. K. Riggs of the Animal Husbandry Department.

Cows, steers, bulls, and calves furnish material for graduate and undergraduate work. Far mers Short Courses, 4-H Club Congress, State Vocational Agriculture Judging Contest, and Field Day for Breed Associations also draw on AH Department Stock.

H Department Stock. Undergraduate work gives specific training in breeding, feeding, management, and disease control in the beef cattle field. Riggs said. Graduate work is designed to give a thorough survey of recent ad-vances in beef production.

The herd is available for stu-dents of judging and feeding, for graduates in thesis problems and for research done by the Agricultural Experiment Sta-

The research field is divided into research in beef cattle feeding, breeding, herd and pasture management. Agricultural Experiment Sub-stations, scattered throughout the state continuously search for information which will lead to the improvement of beef cattle herds, said Riggs.

They work with breeder's problems of inheritance factors, gr wth rate, efficiency of feed utilization, and carcass quality, Cross breeding, increeding, and linebreeding when Winter comes. are used in achieving their goal,




